

REFLECTIONS FROM THE RECTORY

November is of course the month of Remembrance and this year our Royal British Legion service will be at St Peter's Rodmarton at 3pm on 8 November. You will be more than welcome. Almost everyone in this country honours Remembrance Day even if they do so without a great deal of thought but they all do so with integrity of heart. Sacrifice is a powerful image, one of those great Old Testament stories of course holds the cost of sacrifice before us. In Genesis 22 we find Abraham preparing to sacrifice Isaac his son. What monstrous being would command another to sacrifice their child? The innocent suffering for no apparently good reason. It is not hard in my mind to draw a parallel between that and governments sending their sons to be slaughtered in the war to end all wars. The stories diverge of course because God had a plan and the warring nations didn't have a plan or were too arrogant or proud to find an alternative path and so millions died.

Any sane government would have learned from the past but of course in 1939 we did it all over again and in 1945 we topped it off with the atom bomb. These are only the two strongest racial memories in Western Europe. All across the world since the dawn of civilisation we have been fighting so I can understand why our new Labour leader, Jeremy Corbyn would claim it is wrong, that he would never press the button, that we should set an example and disband our armed forcesto show the world the way to peace. His is a muddle headed hope with no foundations. It is irresponsible in a broken world to even begin to think it whilst at the same time he rejects the very truth that might make his hope possible.

God calls Abraham his friend, so why tell him to sacrifice his son? Well of course God had no intention of letting it happen. God challenges Abraham to think about his priorities and to consider how much he really trusts God to fulfil his promise. The passage talks of



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Abraham's 'fear of the Lord' but it is not meant in the way we would, sometimes fear is translated 'awe' and that is much better. How far will you follow the one who imagines and creates the universe and holds all that is in his power and yet offers himself in Jesus as the sacrifice, the cost of our failures, instead of ourselves? Abraham has already told Isaac 'God will provide the lamb'; could he have imagined how true his words were? Abraham sacrifices the ram and calls the place 'The Lord will Provide'. Was his faith shaken or stirred and strengthened by this experience?

If we were to truly follow Jesus the dream of peace could come true for we would cease desiring to exercise power for our own glory but until that day it is fanciful, hopeless and dangerous.

CIRENCESTER EATING DISORDER SUPPORT GROUP



NOTES FROM CULKERTON (cont)

I have been lucky to have nightly visits from several hedgehogs, so a sheltered dry place with lots of leaves under a weather-proof covering is for them. Any fallen apples are left for the Red Admiral butterfly.

Gravel is a low maintenance cover for sitting areas, and a good source of desirable self sown seedlings, so check before you hoe unwanted weeds. However, every now and then the gravel needs a top-up, I use handy bags of pea gravel and rake to level.

The pruned wild blackberries in our boundary hedge are excellent this year, with long trusses of delicious fruit. The vigorous long new shoots, several metres long are trained in as arching curves, these will fruit next year.

TOWARDS WINTER...

The media has worked itself into a frenzy over whether we're going to get a hard winter or not. This is based partly on the never-ending desire to find news, and partly on unusually strong El Nino stirrings in the far away Pacific, where sea surface temperatures have risen to unusual levels. This El Nino activity certainly affects global weather, even as far away as the UK. There is some evidence to suggest that it produces colder, drier winters in northern Europe (and milder, wetter ones in southern Europe).

In southern Britain, we last had a run of cold winters back in the early and mid-1980s, but since then just the odd spell of cold winter weather has occurred – the early months of 1996, December 2010 and January 2011, and more recently the bitter March of 2013, and that's about it. So, yes, we are overdue a cold winter, but then we were seriously overdue a wet September, but September again proved to be one of 2015's drier months.

The abundance of holly berries just now does not foretell anything, least of all arctic conditions. Instead, it reflects on reasonable weather during the spring gone by, which allowed good flowering, pollination and set. Nothing else. And yes, there will be plenty of holly berries this Christmas – though perhaps there won't if we push hungry birds on to eating holly berries early, by flail-cutting the equally well-berried hawthorn hedges to smithereens.... Given the prevalence of cold weather in Russia and Scandinavia during October, we could well host

GARDENING TIPS FOR NOVEMBER

'If you want to be happy for a short time, get drunk; for long time, fall in love; happy forever, take up gardening.'A Chinese Proverb

Many of last month's seed sowing have germinated, all placed in a cold frame, for protection from heavy rain and to take the edge from colder autumn nights. Winter mix salad leaves are doing well; there is still time to make another sowing of these under glass.

Last month I also gave the glass houses a good clean before moving in pots of Dahlias to prolong the flowering period, however I notice that the glass has another growth of algae to be cleaned off before winter. Good light is needed for overwintering seedlings, young plants and cuttings.

The green houses and cold frame are kept very well ventilated on warm days and closed for the night, this is to prevent damping off and moulds growing. It is particularly important for late fruiting grapevines. 'Crimson Seedless' is just starting to ripen now, some of the abundant leaves are also removed to aid air circulation.

This autumn has seen magnificent displays of hardy fuchsias, Michaelmas Daisies, and a rewarding late flush of rose blooms; an abundance of fruits everywhere, and now foliage is giving some wonderful colours.

Talking of foliage, a splendid maroon can come from Corylus maxima 'Purpurea', the leaf colour is from spring to autumn, with pink catkins and tasty filbert nuts; a very good background shrub for white or pastel flowers or bolder purple, reds and orange hues. Ideally this should be planted where the sun backlights the leaves, it is then truly stunning.

In dry weather keep your grass trimmed as this may be the last cut of the year. I have been setting my mower blade higher to achieve 'a spongy turf', which is soft to walk on, does contain mosses, and other flowering plants....and may be better wearing than just grass.

Some of the herbaceous plants are given a good cut back, this includes Iris sibirica, marjoram, lavender and daylilies, trim the leaves close to the ground allowing next year's growing tips to have some winter sun. Others with good architectural stems are left standing.....for me teasels.....if these are not in the right place I simply dig the stem out and secure them in the new location with an inconspicuous stake and ties.

PAWS FOR THOUGHT

It's wonderful the way having a relationship with an animal or household pet changes the dynamics of a family and one that withstands the trials and tribulations of family life. Earlier this year the national papers featured the touching photograph of Sheila Marsh with her favourite horse, Bronwen, in the car park of Wigan Royal Infirmary, saying a last goodbye. Sheila was unable to speak at this late stage but she managed to call to the horse, who came to her and nuzzled her gently on the cheek. The bond between Sheila and Bronwen was clearly strong; she had cared for Bronwen for twenty five years.

This act of kindness by the hospital staff however did more than grant the dying wish of an elderly woman. It touched the lives of the many thousands of people who have seen the image and highlighted again how animals impact positively on our lives and how instinctively they seem to understand our emotional needs. Perhaps more importantly this story has rekindled connections in Sheila's family, with her daughter now talking once again to her father and sister, a sister she hadn't spoken to for 26 years.



RODMARTON RELIGIOUS EDUCATION FUND

The Rodmarton Religious Education Fund (RREF) was created in 2007 following a new lease on church property in the village. It receives a modest annual income from the Diocese of Gloucester Board of Education Trust which is a proportion of the rent. 
