REFLECTIONS FROM THE RECTORY

The week before Advent we welcomed a guest speaker from SAT7, a charity that works to share the story of Jesus and support Christians in the Middle East. Recently some of their staff were arrested because they are a Christian broadcaster. In some places there are clear laws against not following the state's preference. Places such as North Korea where it is an offence punishable by death to be a Christian or some Islamic states where to change your religion from Islam is not permitted. In others there is a clear bias where there are effectively (if not actually) different laws for Muslims and others.

We are fortunate to live in a country where there is little trouble following any religion or none. Even so there is in our modern world an increasing bias against the religious and a wilful re-writing of the past to expunge its positive impact from view whilst shouting loudly at any failures. Most of the time I don't mind that, especially where a priest clearly breaks their calling to live in a way that is honouring to God. We are all sinners of course but priests in particular are called to make Christ present by their lives and should have the self-control to ensure their actions support and encourage the growth and well-being of others, not damage them. As St Paul said we are to "live lives that are self-controlled, upright and godly" we are to be a people "zealous for good deeds". This is a matter of choice, do I follow Christ and have ethics and courage to suit or do I follow the ways of the world? The ethical standard commanded by Jesus is actually very high and he

summed it up by telling his followers that they must love God with all they are and love their fellow human being as they love themselves.

As we struggle to respond to the current refugee crisis how does a Christian perspective hold up a light to the human disaster before us? Our responses seem to be little more than analogous with little boys and fingers in dykes. With one hand we offer some hope with the other we are helping the violence to continue there seems an obvious incompatibility in our decisions and actions. These are truly difficult questions and I won't pretend to have any good answers but it seems to me 'the West' has failed miserably and only made the situation more unstable over the last fifteen years. That maybe unfair and perhaps if we had not been involved at all it would be worse than it is. The simple fact is that in many parts of the world there are large numbers of people fighting and killing and maiming and destroying and there seems little hope of stopping it.

Hope is something Christians should excel at because we believe in someone greater and better than we are. Christmas is all about unexpected hope. Salvation and freedom are normal themes in life. freedom from political oppression, salvation from economic slavery. freedom from our own poor self-image, salvation from our failures and weaknesses. We hope eternally that tomorrow will be better than today, some people buy lottery tickets, some are walking across Europe in hope of a better tomorrow. What do you hope for as Christmas approaches? Advent is a time to reflect on what is truly important and to get ready for an eternal tomorrow in the promise of Jesus.

When Jesus is born it is not for God's benefit but for ours, it is the greatest gift of love offered by the creator for the created. It is the ultimate solution to the evils of our world if we can but grasp it and put aside our fears and weaknesses. On the cross the purpose of God is fulfilled, you cannot have Easter without Christmas and Christmas has no purpose without Easter.

What will be top of your Christmas list this year? Can you buy the things you value the most? "Peace on earth" the angels sing, the transforming presence of God offers real peace and freedom and most of all the assurance of true love. What do you hope for this Christmas?

The latest Coates Parish Council meeting took place on 2 November 2015 and the following items were discussed:

- The Parish Council expressed its dismay at the District Council's decision to withdraw the communal recycling bins from the village. The loss of this service will impact greatly on the activities of the village club and the village hall.
- A volunteer litter pick will be organised shortly to deal with litter problems stemming from the Halloween period. Children and young people will be particularly welcome to volunteer for this environmental project.
- 3. A new street sign for May Tree Close should be installed in January 2016.
- 4. Playground equipment repairs and a general clean-up of the area are to take place. Parents are asked to discourage their children from climbing up trees in the play area as this activity may result in injury.
- 5. A small budget has been earmarked to celebrate the Queen's 90th birthday next year.

?? THREAT TO COATES BUS SERVICES ??

Are you aware of the Gloucestershire County Council 'Funded Public Transport Consultation' currently underway (ends 4 January 2016)?

The GCC is apparently consulting the public about local bus services – in our case the 54A and the 881 services.

Whether you are a regular user of these services, an occasional user, or a non-user, this 'consultation' is important because the outcome could affect not only your ability to get out and about – to appointments, meetings, shopping etc., but it will affect the overall amenity in Coates.

The purpose of the survey is, according to GCC, to make these bus routes 'more sustainable in future.' The choices for route 54A, for example, are as follows:

Option 1: Run regular interval faster and more direct route between Cirencester and Stroud on Mondays to Saturdays with a community transport solution linking villages to the main service.

(In other words the 54A will by-pass Coates)

Option 2: Run fewer journeys on Monday to Friday.

(In other words, the 54A would service Coates only at beginning and end of the school/work day, with nothing in between – effectively cut out the current 'free' service to travel pass holders and leaving many without transport during the day or dependent on taxis.)

We are being asked to vote for either Option 1 or Option 2, although there is room for comment as to which would serve us 'Better' or 'Worse' or 'Same.' Survey forms are available at Gloucestershire libraries or on-line at www.gloucestershire.gov.uk/fundedtransport

Or should we as Coates residents be doing something as a community? Could it be a Parish Council matter (given that Parish Councils are 'allowed to take part in any public enquiry')?

FORGET-ME-NOT

One of my favourite times in Frampton Mansell is the annual crib service on Christmas Eve. Each year the young children sit on the floor of the church as the age old story is told around the stable. As the tale progresses, they are invited to fetch the model figures of the shepherds, baby Jesus, Mary and Joseph and so on. The children's obvious delight in this activity reminds me that the incarnation is so profound and yet so simple that all can appreciate it on different levels Some years ago I had the privilege of visiting Bethlehem and entering what is claimed to be the birthplace of Christ. Whether it really is or not, it certainly made a profound impression on me. Firstly, one had to stoop to enter the very simple cave. The place was not grand in any kind of way. In fact it was about as humble as you could find , the rock -face blackened in places and as unattractive as could be – which gave it a ring of authenticity. I recalled those verses in Philippians chapter 2 :... "Christ Jesus, who, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God as something to be exploited but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness. And being found in human form, he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death even death on the cross."(verses 5b-8)

Those verses inspired the poem which I quote in part:

GOD

Great immeasurable Goodness, Perfect purity, cosmic Creator, Transcendent, Resplendent:

Becomes baby Born lowly In stable, Not able Even to feed himself-

Needs nursing, Totally dependent on a weak woman.

GOD

Almighty, all seeing,
All knowing, each being
completely made by His caring,
Is crying,
Helpless lying
In a mangerLater, dying
a dreadful death
on a cruel cross.

Cannot we comprehend, Begin to understand what it cost to leave so much?

"Thanks be to God!" – cough, splutter, cough, sneeze. The older the building, the richer the acoustics and the more resonant the coughing - which breaks out randomly in one part of the nave, then spreads through the aisles, skipping back and forth, echoing, gaining in resonance and cadence, finally reaching the chancel.

The pregnant pauses are even more bizarre at Bath Abbey, as the cries and chants of partying youth outside periodically permeate the building – "Thanks be to God!" – cough, splutter – "Here we go, here we go...", cough, splutter, snuffle, wheeze. Once a very loud "Bleeding 'ell!" came in upon the midnight clear there, just after it had been announced that the darkness had apprehended it not.

But never mind any of these minor impediments. There is always the crying of humanity, and on Christmas Eve it is almost unanimously happy for once. We should celebrate that. Better still, the Christmas message always conveys itself across. Because it is not a story. It is actual, even if we punctuate it with absurd amounts of interjectory coughing.

much in one time will produce an abundance of non-flowering water shoots.

Salad leaves can be picked through the winter and if the weather is mild another sowing of the winter mix can be made under glass. If you have sufficient space with a little heat early January sowings of tomatoes, aubergines, antirrhinums and sweet peas. Remember to have enough growing on room during March and April.

Christmas table decorations and presents can be grown using various bulbs: Narcissus 'Paperwhite', Hyacinths, Crocus, Tulips and Amaryllis. At this stage they may not flower in time for Christmas but they will give the recipient something to look forward to, and promising buds are always attractive to gardeners, who relish anticipation. Grow most bulbs on in good light and away from direct heat, keep just moist. Amaryllis on the other hand grows very fast and loves a sunny windowsill, also 24hr warmth, so move into the room over night, and water on demand once the bud starts to grow! Walk around your garden at Christmas for flowers to cut and bring into the house. There is often a surprise out of season contender to make you smile!

Also look out for unusual winter garden visitors like bullfinches. A few weeks ago a migrating yellow or grey wagtail briefly made a visit to us; you never know what you might see!

GARDENING TIPS FOR DECEMBER AND JANUARY

As soon as the clocks go back I'm in winter gardening mode with the evenings drawing in far too soon. So continue a general tidy up, weeding being the primary task and clearing unattractive herbaceous top growth, but leave architectural seed heads.

Any garden pots not planted with evergreens for winter or spring displays of bulbs are best emptied of compost and stored in a dry shed; particularly if ceramic pots are not frost proof. Many imported terracotta pots are not fired to a high enough temperature and crack or flake apart during the cold wet months. Planted pots can also be wrapped in insulating layers of bubble wrap, which can be made more attractive with a final layer of hessian and secured with twine. In severe cold this also prevents root damage. Check that any surplus water can drain from the pots; pot feet, bricks, tiles or stone used in threes avoiding the central drainage hole will help.

Trimmed herbaceous tops, annual weeds, leaves and old compost from summer pots can all be added to the compost bin; by turning the bins the composting process is shortened. Simply fill the bins to full capacity and when the level inside drops by about a quarter, remove the bin by pulling it up and away from the contents. The part made compost can then be forked back into the bin, and is completely turned in the process. I'm careful to be gentle with the many resident worms as these are my compost makers.

If you notice puddles forming in vegetable or flower borders, loosen any compacted soil to allow free drainage. Worn areas of turf can be aerated with a fork.

While the weather stays mild without frost there is still time to move plants and split large clumps; aim to retain as much root as possible, add compost to the planting holes and water in this allows fine soil particles to be next to the roots rather than air pockets.

Winter pruning fruit and ornamental trees should only be carried out in dry frost free weather, when dormant. The basic rules are remove dead wood first, then crossing or inward growing and finally step back and see if the overall shape needs adjusting.


In older fruit trees reducing congestion is important, as this will improve the fruit size and quality allowing more light and air to ripen the fruit. This may well be more renovating then just an annual prune and a much bigger task, so aim to do this over several coming winters as too
