Reflections from the Rectory

We British need little encouragement to talk about the weather but it has been a funny winter so far, very warm and wet tending to soggy with barely a frost worth the name. We have autumn and spring flowers out at the same time and I have seen wildlife reports worrying about species that hibernate because they are confused by the weather but the right food is not available. Perhaps such things don't matter much to us with our global economy but I can't help feeling there will be a price to pay somehow for all this.

It is the same with politics isn't it. The German decision to open the borders to refugees for understandable reasons is having repercussions across Europe. The political fanfare of presidential hopefuls in the USA is being led by Mr Trump who seems to be anti almost everyone who doesn't think just like him and yet the polls suggest he might win the Republican nomination and maybe the Presidency. God help us! Whilst the USA lurches to the right over here the Labour party have certainly leapt to the left and the recession seems to have led to a similar polarisation in much of Europe as the South struggles with economic recession and the North with immigration. I can't help feeling there will be a price to pay in the world for all of this.

I also can't help feeling that it mostly stems from the same source. Industrialisation has led to humanity treating the world as something to consume rather than nurture and tend as we would a garden and which was God's instruction to Adam and Eve at the beginning of humanities reign. Global warming is a consequence of a world industrialisation that was either ignorant or careless of the consequences. Changes in weather patterns have led to erratic weather across the globe with some places (usually in the undeveloped nations) suffering droughts and floods adding to political havoc and displacing populations as they seek to escape from the hopeless economic deprivation around them. In some developed countries of course there is a need to hold on to what they gained economically and politically as a result of industrialisation. Building a wall against Mexico (and expecting them to pay for it) is 'get of my land' NIMBYism on a national scale.

How are these two things the same? Essentially economic migration is about someone else having something you want, at its very lowest level, survival. Self interest is the driving force. Protectionism as put forward by Mr Trump is about a refusal to share something you have control of except by your rules which will always ensure your dominance. This too is self interest.

When Jesus died on the cross it was not about self interest it was about sacrificial love, true love seeks the good of the beloved. These days being religious is often seen as suspicious or irrelevant but the lightest observance of human nature reveals a deeply selfish heart, the space between Incarnation (Christmas) and self-sacrifice and resurrection (Easter) is a good time to reflect on the meaning of life and what is really important to us, what we truly hope for. Jesus said we need to love all others as we love ourselves, the world is clearly not very good at doing that.



We all have a role to play and it never ceases to astound me the litter that I clear up, which has regretfully been tossed out of the windows of passing vehicles. It is shameful act to litter our countryside and is not the hallmark of a civilised society.

These statistics about how long it takes for litter to biodegrade, give a clear case why litter should be taken home (which appears such a simple act) and recycled or placed in the waste bin compared to the cost and damage caused by those who decide to toss it out the window of their vehicle:

Orange peel - 2 years Cigarette butts - up to 12 years Plastic bottles - up to 450 years Glass - not biodegradable.

Let's make a difference and show that we care in The Thames Head Benefice and join the campaign and clean up around us. There are several people in Kemble who already play their part in clearance of litter and the more of us that get involved so much the better.

Farming Matters

Once again the weather seems to have dominated the farming calendar over the last few months. We experienced an unusually mild start to the winter with a mean temperature for December of 7.9 degrees, 4.1 degrees above the long term average and the warmest December since 1910. These mild conditions have triggered unseasonal flowering of some plants. Daffodils were seen in flower before Christmas and in some parts oilseed rape crops have already flowered.

It's nice to see some colour but what will this mean for the crops? Oilseed rape will normally produce its tiny black seeds in the summer following flowering in April. If it flowers in December, will there be effective fertilisation and will the seed pods survive the winter? Will it flower again in April? Farmers will have to wait and see. Unprecedented levels of crop diseases are being seen as they thrive in the warm, wet conditions. Yellow Rust, Septoria and Mildew on wheat and a variety of fungal diseases on oilseed rape are normally kept in check by spells of frosty weather. Crop protection fungicides can be applied but with saturated fields farmers are unable to

get to the crops to protect them.

We have also seen extremely wet weather over recent months. Rainfall in the north has been up to 4 times the average resulting in severe and sudden flooding, not only in rural areas but in towns and villages also. These are different circumstances to the Somerset floods we saw 2 years ago. In Somerset water levels rose gradually and stayed high for several weeks, devastating the wildlife in that area. In Cumbria, Yorkshire and latterly Scotland, rivers rose very rapidly and receded equally rapidly. This left no time to rescue livestock and there have been reports of sheep, cattle and forage supplies being washed away by swollen rivers. The charity Forage Aid, which was set up in the wake of the heavy snows in the north 3 years ago, has been active again this year directing vital supplies, donated by other famers, to where they are needed.

The Environment Agency has received a lot of criticism for not providing adequate flood defences for the homes and businesses affected. But with a record-breaking 341mm of rain falling on Cumbria in 24 hours, rivers were just not able to cope. So how should we prepare ourselves for future extreme weather events?

The EA is governed by the EU Water Framework Directive which talks about 'protecting and improving the water environment'. The EA interprets this as protecting wildlife habitats along water courses, hence the reluctance to dredge rivers not only of silt deposits but vegetation and fallen trees etc. River capacity is therefore restricted. But it's not as simple as just dredging rivers. Yes, in Somerset, rivers can be improved to carry more water, more quickly and deposit it into the sea. This has now been done very effectively. In other parts where rivers wind through towns and villages and under bridges and culverts, increasing the capacity upstream will only bring the water more quickly to a pinch point which cannot be enlarged. A different answer is needed. Hold the water back in designated areas of land, which are allowed to flood, where minimal damage is done and flow downstream can be controlled.

In a recent survey over half the farmers questioned said they would be willing to take part in a scheme which managed this. Progress, we hope.

Met Office forecasters say that 2016 looks set to be at least as warm as 2015. Their forecast takes into account the impact of global warming which is being exacerbated by the effect of the El Nino phenomenon from the unusually warm waters of the Pacific. Although they expect 2014, 15 and 16 to be among the warmest on record, this record breaking run is not set to continue indefinitely.

I'm sure next month will see a more upbeat piece from me, Happy New Year!

Parish Council Notebook

Trust you are holding firm on those New Year Resolutions. Here's a suggestion for another; an opportunity to turn a negative into a positive.

The negative is litter. Attention has been drawn to a disappointing decline in standards around our villages. Unfortunately this would seem to echo a national trend to the point where one of the proposed initiatives, covered elsewhere in this magazine, is to celebrate the Queen's upcoming 90th birthday with a campaign entitled "Clean for the Queen". Rather a sad reflection of attitudes amongst a proportion of HM's subjects you might think, but however. The positive is getting residents together, forming a team, to take "collective" action to overcome the issue. The theory is that cleanliness begets more cleanliness so that ultimately the problem, firstly the litter and then the irresponsible attitude that creates it, will disappear. Experienced campaigners Sue Hill and Tom Barrow are ready at the starting gate fully supported by Carol Dougill who will also engage the school pupils in the action, developing the pupils' appreciation of community responsibility in the process. Hope you will feel motivated to add this to your resolutions and will also join the team.

Watching Tim Peake talking on the news about his forthcoming spacewalk to carry out repairs to the International Space Station thoughts turned to the wonders of mans' vision, adventurousness and ingenuity, the imagination, ambition and drive, the capability of creating and sustaining a tiny habitable environment out in the infinity of space. It is truly impressive, absolutely astonishing. A moment of quiet reflection seems appropriate at this point. How can it be that the human race is able to achieve such spectacular wonders but take best part of a year to make half a job of trimming back the trees at horrendous, the junction of the A429 and the A433. Something of a conundrum to say the least. Perhaps an enquiry to our old friend John Chilcot, acknowledged expert in matters of procrastination, would provide an explanation, provided that, of course, you are not in any hurry.

In the event, Tim's spacewalk was brought to a slightly premature close because of concerns about water in his colleague's helmet. This will be an experience wholly familiar to users of School Road where water has also proved troublesome for some time. The formation of an infant lake outside the school car park, while an interesting natural phenomenon, has presented a nuisance and potential hazard for many months. Visits by the Highways contractors failed to resolve matters but fortunately Cllr David Ball, armed with drain rods and quantities of elbow grease proved capable of succeeding where others had fallen short of the mark.

Prospects still look good for the new station car park. Shortly after Christmas, Last Great Western, fully living down to expectations, tabled revised proposals to the CDC too late for either the January or February Planning Meetings. However thanks to cooperation from Arkells Brewery who chipped in an additional strip of land, the one way system is no longer a feature and the scheme generally looks much improved, just needing a few final nips and tucks. So forward we go to the March planning meeting for that critical decision.

Gloucestershire County Council has let us know that it is a participant in what is known as The Big Community Switch. This is a scheme designed to help consumers to save money on their energy bills, generally electricity and gas but of course, only electricity in our case. Interested residents may register with the Council who will then seek quotations from the energy companies in a competitive auction. The best price is then made available to participants. The more participants, the lower the price is likely to be. Registration does not carry any obligation to actually change supplier but previous auctions have produced average annual savings in the region of £200. The current auction ends on 1st February and you can register on line at Gloucestershire.gov.uk/bigcommunityswitch or telephone 01452 42 57 57.

On the matter of value for money the Parish Council has just set its budget for the next financial year. It is unchanged from last year, in fact from several years past so no inflationary effect from us.

After several months of silence the development proposals for the airfield have resurfaced with a request from the proposers for a meeting in the near future. Will keep you posted should anything significant emerge from this. Meanwhile you will probably have seen that, lacking the patience to await finalisation of the CDC Local Plan, proposals for the controversial Chesterton development have now been formally lodged with CDC. Should you have any views on this scheme which you wish to pursue, just a reminder that you are fully entitled to make these known to the Planning Authority either on their website or by letter.

Good news for our resident Alan Mcquillin (Mac) whose Legion d'Honneur, the French premier medal, awarded in this case for selfless acts of heroism in the campaigns to liberate France in 1944, has finally arrived. The medal will soon be formally presented and meanwhile many congratulations to Mac on this very special award.

A very big thank you to everyone who supported Operation Christmas Child 2015 by donating empty shoe boxes, Christmas wrapping paper and items to enable us to fill the shoeboxes - as well as to those of you who donated already filled and wrapped boxes!

Once again, 120 Christmas wrapped shoeboxes, 60 for girls and 60 for boys all aged between 2 and 14, were filled with gifts such as hats, gloves, scarves, stationery, soft toys, dolls, hairbands and jewellery or cars for the boys. Also included in each box where possible were toiletries and, most importantly, a packet of sweets. This year, a box of baby toys was also organised for babies too young for a shoebox.

The boxes were collected and taken to their final destination, including the Ukraine and Belarus where they were delivered before Christmas to children in hospitals, orphanages and schools as well as to children who live on the streets.
