



REFLECTIONS FROM THE RECTORY

Last month saw two important events, a referendum on our membership of Europe and many celebrations to mark the 90th birthday of Her Majesty the Queen. These two events are bit chalk and cheese it seems to me. One has given thanks for a lady who has served her people faithfully and to the best of her ability all her life, a queen who leans heavily on her faith and trust in Jesus and the example he set us all. She seeks to be a disciple just as many of us do and as such is a good example to us all.

The other issue has been put forward by politicians of all colours and persuasions as a decision not about how we serve or support or encourage or look to the greater future and peace of the world but on a narrow selfish agenda of what might gain us individually and perhaps nationally the greatest wealth and prosperity. By the time you read this we will know how we voted but as the weeks and the debate roll by I am increasingly disappointed by the narrow self interest at the heart of the campaign.

When couples come to me seeking to marry I frequently ask them what it is they most hope to gain from marriage or what they most hope for the one they love. Hope is an uncertain word, we can't guarantee the outcome but by our efforts we seek to influence it positively. I have never yet met a couple who did not hope to be happy and fulfilled in their marriage but what does that look like, can happiness and fulfilment be quantified, can it be measured like wealth and possessions? If there were a national happiness tax who would pay the most and why?

Marriage is given as a way to grow more Christlike, that by the gracious and generous giving and receiving of love we might experience more of what God calls love than we otherwise would. A truly successful marriage requires a genuine desire to find good in another and to help that partner grow and flourish to be all they are called to be in God. As we do that together, as we find the image of God in each other and the gift of God in each other something unique and beautiful is created.

On her 21st birthday the then Princess Elizabeth declared that long or short her life would be devoted to our service as her people, her extended family. She has I think kept her promise faithfully. Jesus said there shall be no distinction of race or wealth among those who follow Christ for all who follow Jesus are called to be members of one extended family. I don't know how you voted (I don't know how I voted

yet either) but I hope the decision was made on what we believe will most enable God's world to flourish and be the best it can be. Sacrificial love is the only kind their really is.

She was autistic, but at Coates Rectory she regularly rode her ponies Gay and Lotty; and one summer holidays she learned to swim in the pools in the Biddulphs' and Gilbys' gardens. She was a great bike rider and one year clocked in at fifteen churches over a twenty miles circuit for the Historic Churches Preservation Trust Bike Ride.

She was a very spiritually sensitive person and she loved church services – especially the hymns – and it was because of Emma that we started the RDA Pageants which gave delight to so many. And indeed it was because of her that Sue founded the Watershed RDA Group.

Autism is a hard place to be: it's a bit like living in a prison. At the remarkable funeral service at Amberley Church we recognised this, but we also celebrated our belief that for her the key has now been found, and that she is free. "Here we see through a glass darkly, but there face to face".

Sue and Andrew are very grateful for your prayers for Emma, and them and Polly's family in the very tragic death of their nine year old granddaughter Bonnie.

The chances of us seeing many Seven-spot Ladybirds this summer are, though, decidedly low. Modern pesticides prevent the aphid population build-ups of the mid-1970s, not just here but all over western Europe, and this once-common ladybird is now scarce. If we ever experience another ladybird summer on the scale of 1976, it is likely to be because a new non-native species of ladybird with a different ecology has arrived and flourished. The alien Harlequin Ladybird, which arrived here in 2004 and has since colonised nearly all of England, might just do it, but will need a seriously hot spring and summer.

compost. Hoe off fast germinating annual weeds before sowing and planting in these plots. Spinach 'Medania' can be sown in early August, the leaves taste sweeter after cold autumn weather, but can be picked from October through winter until the following May.

LADYBIRDS - 40 YEARS ON

We are forty years on from that mother of all summers, the long hot summer of 1976. It was the Year of the Ladybird, memorable for a veritable plague of these aphid-feeding beetles. There was no avoiding the ladybird hordes; everyone who was around that summer remembers them. One observer recalls: 'I remember seeing the greenfly and aphids drifting past like green smoke. This went on for at least a couple of days. Then came the ladybirds!' They were tracking the aphid swarms. There are accounts of holiday makers running from beaches in Brighton and Weston super Mare. The ladybirds were biting people, apparently (or maybe people, or perhaps the ladybirds, had been watching too many scary movies). All the starving ladybirds were seeking, of course, was moisture and food. There were too many of them, and they were desperate in the heat.

The signs were there in spring, for the then-common Seven-spot Ladybird appeared in remarkably high numbers, having flourished during the heat of 1975 and then overwintered unusually well during a mild, dry winter. Crucially, populations of the two parasitic flies that help to control ladybird numbers were low, the weather was perfect, and aphid populations were at an astoundingly high level.

An interesting theory which partially explains the aphid abundance has just been published, by the Professor of Entomology at Harpur Adams University. In the early 1970s a new variety of winter wheat, called Maris Huntsman, was being ardently promoted as a high yield, disease-resistant variety. However, the research scientists had failed to spot that aphids loved it, and that it produced poor quality bread! About half the winter wheat grown in 1976 was of this variety. These fields acted like a magnet to aphids – and the ladybirds homed in on the aphids, to sort them out. Incredibly, many combine harvesters

NEWS FROM SAPPERTON AND FRAMPTON MANSELL

FORGOT-ME-NOT

Late spring and early summer are my favourite times of the year and I have been greatly enjoying the sunny spell we have had in early June. I am grateful to God that Frampton Mansell is such a wonderful place to live at this time of the year, but I am also aware of the fact that we must not presume that its natural delights will always be here. When we first moved to the village over 13 years ago, skylarks could still be heard in the meadow above our house. Now I never hear them there. It's also years since I heard a cuckoo.

Some wild flowers have also disappeared or been greatly reduced in our village - the number of Ladies' Smock/Cuckoo flowers has decreased alarmingly, camomile flowers, now rather rare, have completely disappeared and even the blue wild geranium that used to be bursting out all over on the verges is on the decline. For that reason, we have been trying to leave a patch of grass near our house uncut during the summer for the wild flowers to bloom again. The first year that this happened I was amazed to wake up one morning in spring to find a sizeable part of it covered with the beautiful delicate pale mauve Ladies' Smock flowers which had had no chance to blossom there for many a year. Later in the summer, we were delighted to see several orchids growing on the patch. Yes, it's a bit untidier, but places like this are vital if the horrendous decrease in our native wild flowers is to cease. ((95% of wild flower meadows in England have disappeared since the end of World War II). We owe it to the next generation!

God placed Adam and Eve in a garden, with the task of looking after it. Many in our area are doing a splendid job tending this corner of England in their private gardens, feeding the birds and making provision for the decreasing number of hedgehogs as well. Let's do the same for the wild flowers he has put in our care.

"Then God said, 'Let the earth bring forth grass, the herb that yields seed...and the earth brought forth grass, the herb that yields seed according to its kind. And God saw that it was good." From Genesis 1 verses 12-13.

NOTES FROM CULKERTON

GARDENING TIPS FOR JULY AND AUGUST

There is nothing better to me than the English summer garden; all has gone well for the roses, which looked magnificent in June. Although last year was a good apple year, the blossom this year was bountiful, so a good crop will follow, which may be lighter but of good quality with larger fruit. Plum trees managed flowering time to perfection, dodging a block of late severe spring frosts, and then taking advantage of early May warmth for pollination, so immature plums are doing well now.

Whichever way you choose to grow tomatoes - under glass, outside, planted in the ground or in containers - pay attention to the variety that you are growing. Taller varieties need support and the removing of side shoots. Bush, trailing and compact varieties may only need some sections removed if the growth becomes too dense and inhibits picking fruit. All need careful watering and weekly liquid feeds.

Also feed roses after the earlier flush of blooms and make sure to dead head unless decorative hips follow. Last year during May, I had to 'cut to the ground' Rosa 'New Dawn' as our neighbours needed to replace their fence. This was a blessing in disguise; my plant, over 25 years old, was completely regenerated and now has plenty of new growth with an impressive quantity of blooms, all trained in the 'Waterperry' way, using low arcs of bent hazel rods.

Yesterday, I saw a beautiful old rose, grown in the relaxed natural arching 'Arts & Crafts' style of more than a century ago. This plant had been rescued from a building site in Tetbury some years before. It is an old, as yet un-named variety, and has a look of continental breeding in an exquisite shade of deeper pink; the abundant double blooms have a very neat arrangement with each petal reflexed, revealing a silvered pink. Growing to between 2 to 3 metres, the arching stems could also be trained on a wall. Three cheers for all plant rescuers! Now is the time to look ahead to the next season. Gather any seeds from plants that have done well or have particularly appealing colours; any hardy types are best sown fresh, some like aquilegias or irises may have a delayed germination. Keep weeding, and have in your mind 'One year's weeding, seven years seeding'. As you will know I garden organically and one distinct disadvantage of using herbicides is that dying weeds will drop their viable seeds.

Prepare the ground for autumn sowings and plantings. It is much easier and pleasant in dry warm weather, incorporate any homemade
