

REFLECTIONS FROM THE RECTORY

First of all a big thank you to everyone who supported the collection for Samara's Aid in January. For those fleeing the violence in Syria and Iraq warm clothes can make a huge difference to physical wellbeing as well as saying that somewhere, someone actually cares about their desperate situation.

I hope you all enjoyed a relaxing and enjoyable Christmas period and that Jesus really was at the heart of your celebrations. Over the Christmas period I watched part of a programme 'Back in time for Christmas' reflecting on how our celebration has changed since the 1950's. The teenage boy in the family commented that he enjoyed the modern Christmas best as it was all about the presents. He certainly summed up the experience of many and yet if that is true it is a waste of time and resources. The clue to its significance really is in the name. ChristMass is the celebration and remembrance of the arrival of Jesus the Christ or Anointed – the one sent by God to bring a new and personal grace to all of us. The presents we give in love to those we love reflect, firstly the gift of God in Jesus to humanity and secondly the gifts of the Wise Men who in Matthews gospel come bearing gifts of significance and purpose for the new-born King.

As some of you will be aware within the Thameshead Churches we have been discussing changes to our pattern of services and we will be bringing in a new trial service pattern in January. There are a number of reasons for this. Primarily with six parishes and nine buildings over more than 70 square miles we could not continue to resource so many services with one full time minister, one part time and very generous support from our volunteer readers and retired ministers. We also believe that this will allow us to pursue a number of new or revamped ideas and to work together better as a benefice in many ways.

The most significant change is a move to a **monthly** benefice service on the fourth Sunday of each month. When a significant festival is on the fourth Sunday (such as Mothering Sunday or Christmas in 2017) we will have our usual rota of services in each parish and not a benefice service. This also means that *The Source*, our informal worship at All Saint's Kemble, will move to the **first** Sunday of each month from February still at 6pm. On the fifth Sundays the parishes will all be looking to complement their existing worship and so there may well be a lot of variety in time, place and style even within each parish, so please do check for details on those days.

We will try and keep the website updated and have put in the baseline but need to edit it for special occasions (like Mothering Sunday). By the time you read this we expect that to be completed. For those with access to the internet the following links will take you to our website pages:

COATES PARISH CHURCH NEWS

As many of you will know, St Matthew's has started a new rota of services. The 1st and 3rd Sundays of the month will be Holy Communion, the 2nd Sunday will be either a Family Service or Cafe Church led by the congregation, the 4th Sunday will be a combined benefice service for all the benefice churches, with each church taking a turn to host, and the 5th Sunday will be led either by the congregation or a vicar. Everyone is welcome at all the services.

A few of us met this week to discuss the services at St Matthew's, but we extended the discussion further to see what people felt the church could do within the community and what changes need to be made to appeal to the wider community of Coates. There were comments on the fact that there is no loo or church hall, it can be cold and the car parking is poor. There was also a suggestion that perhaps we could establish a rota system of driving/accompanying people who may be less able or not sure about coming on their own to church. We would love to get feedback from people as to whether this might be helpful and what thoughts you have.

One other thing that came up was the financing of the church. At the moment we need to raise £15k pa which is paid monthly to the Diocese. Any maintenance on the church, lawn mowing, cleaning, gardening etc is over and above this sum. Our church receives no funding from the 'national' church body; we have to fund it ourselves. We have a parish giving scheme which several people do contribute to monthly by standing order and we are enormously grateful for that.

We mention this as we are not sure everyone realises that the Church needs support from the whole community to ensure its general running, maintenance and upkeep of the building itself. It is a beautiful building and many appreciate that it remains open during the day and that at some point are able to use it for baptisms, weddings and funerals. Some of the team that have run it up until now, several for many years, are leaving at the end of April, and we need new people to join the team. We will be discussing many of these issues at our Sunday service on 5 February so please do come along to listen and to contribute thoughts. hoglets born in spring and early summer will reach that desirable weight, unless injured, diseased or infested with parasites.

Hedgehog hibernation is remarkable. Their metabolism slows down to near zero, the heart rate reduces from about 190 beats per minute to around 20, body temperature drops from 35°C to 10°C or less, and respiration almost ceases. In severe cold their blood can start to freeze. It all sounds risky, and indeed it is: hibernating hedgehogs can be disturbed by human activity, or by inquisitive animals, such as dogs, and predators such as badgers; and mild spells in winter can rouse them out of hibernation at a time when food resources are scarce – and make them waste vital energy. Our modern mild winters may not be helping this native mammal.

Research by the British Hedgehog Preservation Society and the People's Trust for Endangered Species indicates that our hedgehog population is in serious decline: already this century urban populations have fallen by 30% and rural populations by 50%. Certainly, the hedgehog needs friends, and our feeling of responsibility towards it is clearly growing.

weather arrives. An alternative is to wait until late April, still sow with heat, and keep the young plants inside but for a shorter time to grow faster before planting under glass or outside. This later sowing will be a few weeks later in cropping than the earlier sowing. Another vegetable to start are broad beans, either sown into the plot. But if the weather or soil conditions are poor, wet and cold, plant the beans into pots or trays under cover in a cold, unheated greenhouse or frame. The young bean plants can be transplanted to the garden when they are about 15cm tall.

HEDGEHOG NEWS

This autumn and winter animal rescue centres throughout the land have been inundated with undersized juvenile hedgehogs, known as hoglets. Some rescue centres have had to turn these hoglets away.

Our local centre, Oak & Furrows Wildlife Rescue Centre near Cricklade (01793 751412), was caring for 120 juveniles in mid-January. At peak, in late autumn, they had 160. Each of these needed individual care and attention, and usually their own hot water bottle. Oak & Furrows aims to release the hogs back where they were found, once they have reached a suitable size for survival.

Most hoglets are born during the main breeding season of May, June and July. Hedgehogs born then should, in theory, have grown sufficiently to be able to enter hibernation normally, in mid to late autumn. But hedgehogs can produce a second litter in August and September. It is this early autumn litter that has been filling the wildlife centres, because without help those hoglets don't stand much chance of survival.

Either hedgehogs are producing more second litters nowadays, or people have become more aware of the plight of this endearing and essentially beneficial mammal and are increasingly looking out for individuals in need of help – or both. It is possible that climate change is stimulating hedgehogs to breed earlier than normal, thus enabling them to attempt an unviable second litter; or, that parents are lured into producing second litters because first litters are inexplicably failing.

Hedgehogs need to weigh at least 450g in order to have sufficient fat reserves to hibernate successfully, ideally around 600g. Nearly all

COATES PARISH COUNCIL

Coates parish council met on Monday 9 January 2017. The following items were discussed:

- 1. Coates Cricket Club Cllr Allen is to work with Coates Cricket Club to investigate if rights to use the land by the club can be clarified and if cricket can continue to be played in Coates.
- 2. Problems with Gigaclear's cable laying work in December have been reported to the parish council and residents' issues have been put to representatives of Gigaclear. The council has expressed its dismay at the lack of communication from the company and the poor quality of work carried out to Gloucestershire County Council and the Highways Agency. It is understood that Gigaclear will be back in the village at some point to complete their works programme.
- 3. The council has been informed that it is not possible to erect '20 is Plenty' signs along the main road in Coates as this is a 30mph speed limit area. However, three volunteers have agreed to undergo training in the use of community speed cameras and it will be possible to monitor drivers' speeding once training has been provided.
- 4. The council proposed to move forward with its plans to draw up a Neighbourhood Plan and is seeking funding to assist with this project.
- 5. It is hoped to be able to install a disability access gate to provide access to certain green spaces in Coates for those in wheelchairs. The council will work with the Bathurst Estate to make this happen once the appropriate quotations have been received.

The next parish council meeting is scheduled to take place on Monday 6 March at 7.30pm in the village hall. Members of the public are welcome to attend.

GARDENING TIPS FOR FEBRUARY

Welcome to the new gardening season. Lighter days improve the growth of plants far more than any other factor. Cyclamen coum seem to put out more flowers a week into the New Year regardless of temperature, although these have been in bloom for several weeks already.

Today I have noticed that following a cold snap of a week so, the milder conditions have encouraged hyacinth buds to break the ground surface. Several varieties were planted about 4 years ago during September and give a lovely fragrant show each April in the garden beds.

Early spring bulbs are now in peak show time, on warmer sunny days I have great pleasure in watching bees visit the open cups of crocus, their petals glisten and their anthers have deep orange pollen. Our county is snowdrop country, so take advantage of the gardens open to the public this month to view snowdrops en-mass.

Fruit trees are sold in the supermarkets this month. Buy them as soon as they appear, but do soak roots before planting for at least 2hrs, overnight is better. These are suitable either growing in well prepared ground or large pots. Rootstocks determine the height and vigour of fruit trees, so for more compact trees look out for MM106 (Semi dwarfing) reaching 3 to 4m, M9 (Dwarfing) reaching 2 to 3m, or M27 reaching 1.8metres. For the more adventurous, rootstocks can be purchased from specialist nurseries for grafting or budding your own fruit trees, these nurseries will also have catalogues of some fine fruit varieties including older heritage types.

February is a key month for planning, no matter the size of your plot. The questions are what to grow, where to plant & how many? With vegetables think about harvest time; it will be no good if this peaks when you are away on your holidays. Also a simple rotation of crops is sensible. In the flower garden what is your style?
