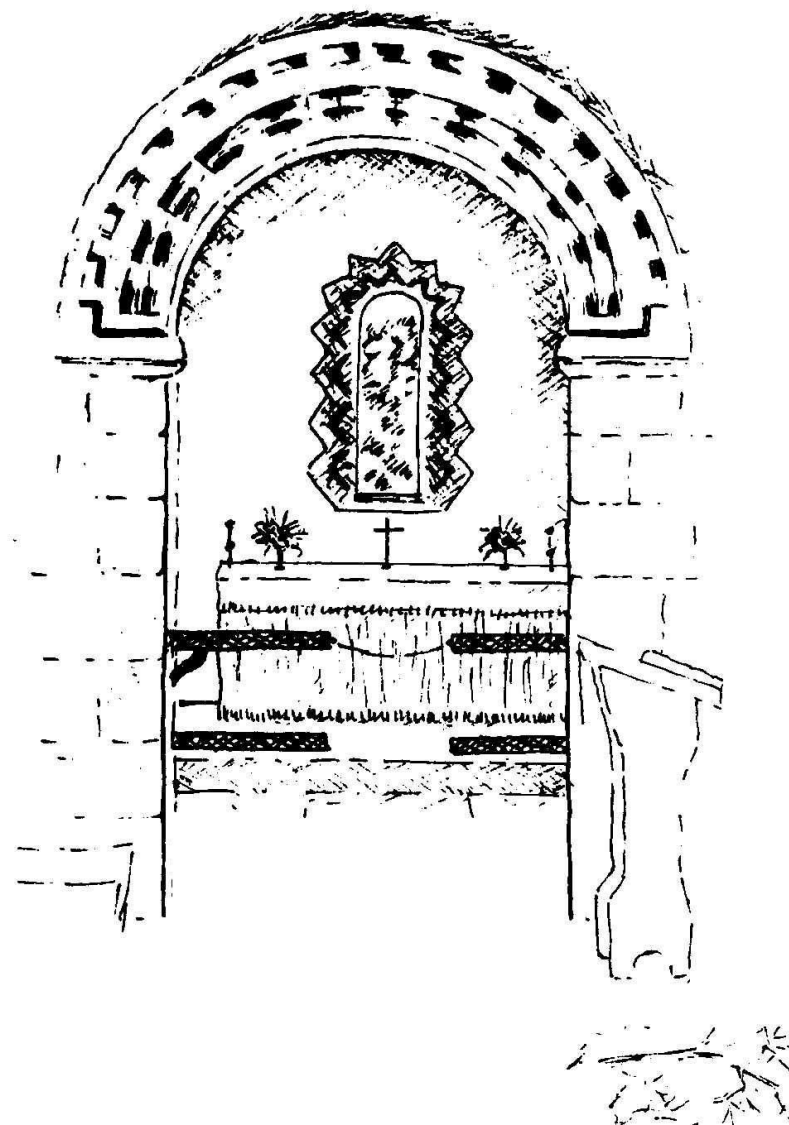

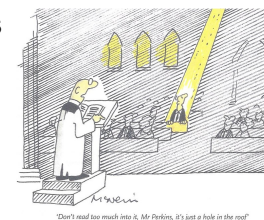

REFLECTIONS FROM THE RECTORY

A friend of mine sent me this cartoon recently as he thought I would find it amusing, as I did. As intended, it set me to thinking about its different interpretations. Firstly that our historic building are in constant need of love and care and secondly about how God might communicate or desire to communicate with us and our expectations or imagination about God and how we might be in communication with him. The idea of communication with God might seem impossible or not to you, but it is a fundamental question to ask if we are trying to understand the nature and purpose of God and his creation. If you believe in the transcendent, then seeking to understand it as best we can seems a good plan of action. The great beam of light, the pointing finger, the Damascus Road experience; these are all possible and do point to the power of God. But I tend to think they also highlight our deafness, our lack of awareness of God so that he has to shout to be heard over all our noise. This brassy approach to conversation does not imply the close and intimate relationship the Christian community says is more typical of God's character. Jesus himself is the ultimate communication from God; He comes without fanfare, he lives modestly and he dies well if unpleasantly. In between, his conversation and miracles touch the lives of many and draw them into a deeper understanding of God. Turning water into wine was probably not even noticed by many of the guests. Calling Zacchaeus or forgiving a prostitute, healing a child or a blind man; these things changed individuals and communities. Challenging a rich man to examine what he really valued and giving him the opportunity to reflect and choose is not coercive but supportive and loving and above all hopeful.



God is always hopeful that we will choose to invite him into our live but he never forces us, however hard the consequence of that rejection might be. Scripture witnesses to that with Adam and Eve and every book affirms its truth, for God's love today is the same as it has always been. Allegorically this cartoon is very accurate. God has a plan and a purpose for all of us, he calls all of us in the hope we may receive his grace and love and choose to become disciples and follow Jesus. He wants to be in an intimate and personal relationship with us, the only issue is whether we want to be in a purposeful relationship with him.

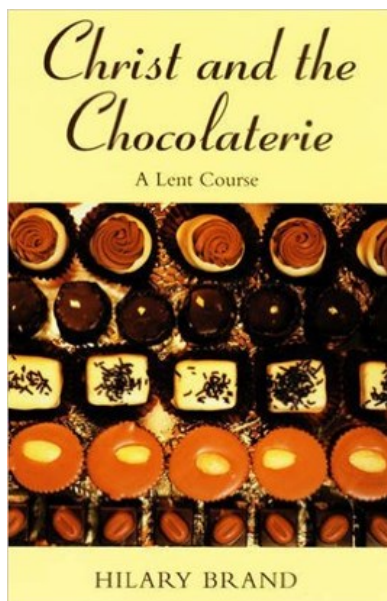

Try something new for 2017.

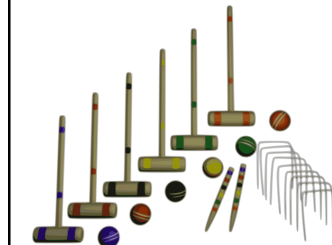

So often the comment from newcomers is 'I wish I had discovered this game earlier'.

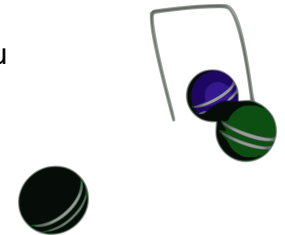

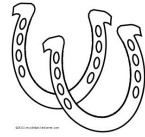
TRAINING TO USE SPEED CAMERAS

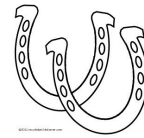

NOTES FROM CULKERTON (cont)

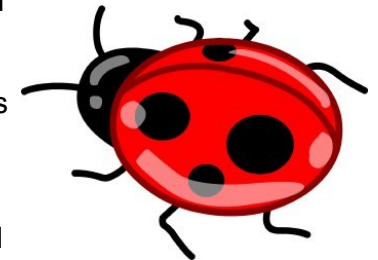
Peony growers should be careful not to cover the crowns with extra compost as these become too deep underground and the ability to bloom will diminish, but these do need a feed and soil improvement; so add compost carefully around the crown rather than on top. There is still time to prune roses and Viticella clematis; also feed these now just before they come into growth and again in a month's time. Make any repairs to lawns by sowing grass seed.

I have additional preparation, for now is the countdown to NGS Culkerton and Ashley open gardens, 10 this year. The grass will continue to be cut on a high setting, many more wild flowers are seeding into the grass areas especially primroses. The box hedges need a feed and a trim. I have many seedling foxgloves to plant out in my long border so I hope these will be in flower for mid-June so fingers crossed!

SPRING LIFT-OFF DAY

It may have already happened, and you may have missed it, though I hope you haven't: I'm talking about the magical spell, lasting an hour or two, around this time of year, when spring suddenly lifts off. It begins mid-morning when the ladybirds and hibernating queen bumblebees all take to the air and head off sunwards in a whirr and a buzz, and the drone fly hoverflies awake. This usually happens around 11.30am GMT (or 12.30pm for rebellious folk like me who stay faithful to British Summer Time (BST) all-year-round).



You can see it coming: the larks ascend just before 10am (BST, or 9am your time), the rookeries get seriously worked up, the Mistle Thrush sings loud and clear, the celandines open up on mass, and the weather forecast indicates a day of warm sunshine, next to no wind, and a maximum temperature of at least 13°C for the first time in the year. An hour later, the yellow Brimstone butterflies leave the bramble, ivy or holly tangles in which they've been hibernating and begin their springtime wanderings, just for an hour or two, before they again bed down as the temperature drops.

NOTES FROM CULKERTON

GARDENING TIPS FOR MARCH

I like this month. The clocks return to summer time on the 12th, we have the Vernal Equinox on the 20th, and Mothering Sunday on the 26th. It is also St. Patrick's Day on the 17th and I have a lovely lemon yellow narcissus of the same name. As the weather conditions each year vary, so does the flowering time each year, as with Narcissus 'February Gold' (late show this year); will these be in bloom as the name implies?

March is also a very exciting time for fans of *Fritillaria imperialis* as the flowering stems now start emerging from the ground growing at a spectacular rate. My plants do regularly set seed in large beautiful pods, but self-sown seedlings are rare so these are best collected and sown in a free draining gritty mixture; germination is good from fresh seed the following spring, but they do take several more years to grow bulbs large enough to be planted out, so a long time in a nursery bed is required.

Daffodils are now well in season. Narcissus 'Pistachio' has caught my eye, creamy pale yellow with a green overlay on shaded petals, an artist's delight and growing to 30cm tall.

While giving the shrub beds in my garden a light winter tidy up I was delighted to find a hedgehog overwintering nest. This is the first one I have ever found and comprised of a bowl-shaped hollow about 15cm deep with a deep thatch of collected dried leaves, stems and grass from the surrounding border plants. Nestled under the evergreen leaves of a hardy fern. Although the nest was empty – apparently hedgehogs use several - the upper layers of the 'thatch' was very damp due to very heavy rain but the inside layers were quite dry. I felt sorry for disturbing the nest as I hadn't realised what it was at first, so I hope the hedgehog will use this again and I have added a large bunch of dried grass adjacent to the nest to make good any repairs.

Frogs should be in our pond and making an evening chorus. This is too late to disturb pond plants for division, I prefer to do this during the summer when the little froglets have left the pond and the water is warmer too!

Monthly tasks are to prepare plots, weeding, tilling, forking over, adding compost, allowing the ground too warm and making advance sowings inside. Clean greenhouse glass and keep well ventilated during the day, ideally from about 10am to 4pm.

GREAT COTSWOLDS CLEAN UP COMPETITION

THOUGHTS FROM FRAMPTON MANSELL

"Almost overnight comes gusty March and the first real rousing of Spring - a time of blustering alarms and nudging elbows...It is a bare world still, but a world of preparation...against the naked face of the countryside...Giant combs stir the woods, shaking out catkin and pussy willow - and the birds no longer hop singly about...but suddenly take wing and chase each other, clamouring with new intentions...the dawn songs of these birds are like drops of warm oil in the dark, liquid sounds that pour softly upon our deadened senses, healing us back to life.." (*Laurie Lee*-from 'Other notes on the English Year')

And, in fact, we see some of these signs in February now as the world warms and the seasons move earlier. But in Frampton Mansell we have had to face a huge jolt as the seasons change. Our railway line, beloved and picturesque location of many a steam train's passing in the minds of some, has once again become the site of another untimely death.

This is not the place to discuss the reasons why, but rather to gently suggest that God is not the cause nor yet is he indifferent to all the suffering. The bible tells us to weep with those who weep* and Jesus himself wept at Lazarus's graveside before he called him forth and presaged his own resurrection**, and he conquered death and suffering on that first Easter day. From my experience, if we want him to, he will be with us at our own point of bereavement and pain- not necessarily to take them away, but to help us through them.

"The Lord is my shepherd, I shall not want...He restores my soul... though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil; for you are with me..." (*from Psalm 23*).
