SIGNS

As I write it's Holy Week, just before Easter and wherever you look there are signs of new life. Buds are appearing, the grass and weeds are beginning to grow! Birds are nesting and there are lambs in the field. Living in this beautiful part of the world, we are surrounded by all these signs that point to a 'resurrection:' - Life emerging from death. Living in the northern hemisphere it's easy to take for granted that these 'signs' appear just at the time when we mark the Easter story, of the death and resurrection of Christ. Those living in the Southern Hemisphere are in Autumn when everything is dying back and it's getting colder. I am thankful for Spring occurring when it does, as I need these reminders. They help me to reflect on the wonder of Easter. I hear someone say, 'It's not really life emerging from death, because the plants are just sleeping during winter!' True, but when a seed is sown, it has to die in order to reproduce!

I've just turned 70, and am beginning to reflect more seriously on how long I have left. As a former policeman and hospital chaplain I am experienced in dealing with death. Now I am beginning to realise that it is quite another thing to address one's own death instead of the death of others! It's been referred to as that 'moment of truth' which understandably we all shy away from. Particularly in hospital it is usually accompanied by tears as we face up to our own vulnerability. The Psalmist in Psalm 90 verse 12 says 'teach us to number our days, that we may apply our hearts unto wisdom' (AV). Yes our days are numbered! The realisation of that truth ought to make us 'apply our hearts unto wisdom'. What does he mean? In Proverbs chapter 9 verse 10 it says 'The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom' (AV). 'Fear' here means to have regard for, acknowledge, reverence. My friends, however old you are, let us join together in regarding, acknowledging and having reverence for the Creator of all this vast array of 'signs' all around us. They point to resurrection from death! Come and make peace with Him by accepting that what Jesus did on that cross includes you! This wonderful truth extends beyond Easter into all the seasons when signs of new life are less noticeable. With love and prayers,

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

white one with flame-orange wing tips. In our district its caterpillars feed mainly on Garlic Mustard (also known as Jack-in-the-Hedge). The plant flourishes in bare ground patches created where the flail hits the ground: the butterflies home in on it, and lay their eggs on its buds – then plant, eggs and caterpillars are destroyed, as cutting occurs before the caterpillars wander off to pupate (in July). This is why our Orange Tips are in decline.

A few plants actually benefit from this regime: coarse grasses like Cocksfoot and False Oat Grass, nettles, and, curiously, the beautiful blue Meadow Cranesbill, which is increasing. But Oh! the poor orchids, scabiouses, vetches, and the rest.

Think bees, think butterflies, think biodiversity (if you like the word), think Barn Owl and the Field Voles it depends upon – all creatures of rough grassland. And the machine is made to cut as close to the ground as possible, slaughtering any animal that attempts to live there (but at least they don't get injured, there are no survivors).

There must be an easy win-win here: rationalise mowing to needy sections only; reduce the number of summer cuts; save some money - and mend some more potholes instead or even fund a library, a school, or a hospital. We've been unfortunate in that we've had a run of wet springs and strong vegetation growth years, but should we get a drought summer the verges wouldn't grow, and the machines might fall silent. Sometimes one feels like a voice crying in the wilderness... Matthew Oates

NOTES FROM CULKERTON (cont)

The very dry conditions of previous months may have inhibited vegetable seed germination, given some showery weather these will still come through. I have one neighbour who gardens on a very heavy soil, which has set so hard that all cultivation is difficult or near impossible; giving the ground mulches of compost particularly in autumn and spring does improve heavy soil so that it does become workable. Earthworms do a lot of the work in taking the compost deeper into the ground, and more earthworms become more visible as the soil improves.

You can make your own grow bags from old compost bags. The plastic is quite tough and durable for re-use. Roll the cut end halfway down and fill with compost so that the bag sits on the ground, add a few drainage holes. The advantage over the rather flat grow bags available to buy is a deeper space for roots. Plant one tomato seedlings one to a bag, these will be light enough to move to a sunny spot.

TRIMMING TIME...

By the time you read this road and lane verge trimming will have commenced.

Why do we do it so extensively? Somehow, in austerity Britain, with councils supposedly struggling for funding, money is found to pay contractors to flail-cut all our road and lane verges. And not just the obvious, needy bits like junctions, blind corners and other crucial sight lines, or even major roads; but the lot, irrespective. And not just the verge edges, where vegetation might overhang, scratch vehicles and injure cyclists. And not just once a summer. Even the below-the-sightline hollow in the north-west sector of the Culkerton – Cherington crossroads on the A433, with its Cowslips, is cut twice a summer. It would be interesting to learn what the objectives are, and where the budget comes from?

By early May our lanes are white with Anthriscus sylvestris, the humble Cow Parsley or Queen Anne's Lace. Now, as soon as the plant flowers the flail cutter appears, and pulverises the lot. If left, it would die back naturally. What's amazing is that the plant keeps coming back for more. But for how long?

Summer verge-flailing is a death trap for the Orange Tip butterfly – the

NOTES FROM CULKERTON

GARDENING TIPS FOR MAY

This year April became more like May with many plants coming into bloom a month early, which is a pleasant experience after the past few years of late spring weather followed by cool damp summers. However, this has left me wondering if there will now be a flowery gap in early or midsummer so I have been sowing a few more annuals in trays. Also, keeping horticultural fleece handy to protect vulnerable young plants or shoots from frosty nights. Planting out tender annuals after 25 May when there is a full moon is advisable.

Swallows migrated to the UK in early April on a warm south easterly wind, I noticed aphids also appeared as did ladybirds. The resident small bird population, particularly Wrens, Blue, Great and Long Tailed Tits, set about feasting on aphids all through my garden, and cleared these very effectively. At the time of writing our House Martins are imminent and very welcome.

I noticed that several types of wild bees have been very busy pollinating and maybe there will a chance to collect seed from different types of garden plants. I have been enjoying a very good display of hybrid hyacinths, now over but heavy with seed capsules. These will take a few years to reach flowering size but could yield some delightful colours, perhaps some pale pastel blues and mauves. Likewise, this has been an exceptionally good set for hellebores, so the most interesting colours and shapes will be worth sowing as soon as the seed is ripe in a few weeks' time.

This year I will be taking part in an experiment called Blooms for Bees. This involves growing single flowered Dahlias from seed and noting which colour the bees, particularly bumble bees, prefer. The short Dahlia 'Mignon' trial seeds 2017 are free, and come in three colours, white, red and purple. I found about 20 seeds of each colour, sown in separate 9cm pots which only took 5 days to germinate, these will be pricked out one to a 9cm pot or deep trays when they have more pairs of leaves. Ready to be planted out in the borders or large pots later this month. For more information on this trial or to take part, there is still time to sow, go to www.BloomsForBees.co.uk

Any early flowering plants or bulbs should be deadheaded and given a good feed to promote strong growth for the production of next year's flowers. The leaves of bulbs should be allowed die down in their own time.
