REFLECTIONS FROM THE RECTORY

I guess as you receive this the Winter Olympics will just have finished and you may have relished your favourite sports (mine will be the Ice hockey and the ski jumps), enjoyed new ones or ignored it all entirely depending on your interests. For those who participate it is the culmination of years of preparation and training. They have sacrificed all sorts of things in order to be the best they can be and such selfcontrol, focus and determination should be applauded and recognised whatever the sport. They have consumed special diets and contorted and exhausted their bodies physically and mentally as well as studying their chosen discipline and seeking tactical and technical advantages over their rivals in every way they can.

In contrast I wonder how many of us kept New Year resolutions to not drink alcohol, eat less chocolate, take more exercise, read more books or spend more time with our families? One of the most quoted passages of scripture must be Jesus rebuke to Peter 'Could you not even watch with me one hour?' It reflects that same human weakness. For whatever reason most of us are lazy most of the time. We find it a challenge to be motivated even when it is in our own interest. For years now governments of every colour and persuasion have been telling us to eat more healthily, to reduce fat or sugar intake, to 'eat 5 a day' or whatever the current plan is to make us more healthy.

We mostly don't though do we?

In our current secular society where eternal life is about cryogenic freezers against the great day when technology can extend our physical and mental health into centuries rather than about heaven there is a new information direction. Every day someone points out how our lifestyle choices are reducing our life expectancy. Do you smoke? It will kill you. Are you obese or eating too much fat or too much sugar? It will kill you or disease you sooner than you deserve. Don't get me wrong I am not disputing the science or its impact on health care costs, just our willingness to respond effectively to the research which it seems is pretty clear.

Perhaps like me you have scoffed at President Trump's refusal to accept global warming and in particular the recent tweets about the East Coast and even Florida experiencing huge snowfalls as evidence it couldn't be true? He doesn't understand the science or is selective in his reading of it. That isn't though very different to my inability to have sufficient self-discipline to eat more healthily and exercise more effectively because it really will have good long term benefits for my health. All the evidence is there.

Likewise I know that as a disciple of Jesus I need to amend my life to reflect God's goodness and love and purpose for me. I know that if I seriously seek to be more Christlike, then I will experience an ever closer and more fulfilling friendship with the divine. I am just not as good at it as I would like to be. That is part of being human, being slightly incomplete and a little less than I could be.

I think God wants me to grow and experience his perfection because then the knowledge and wisdom comes from personal experience, it resides in head and heart and is all the more powerful and resonant as it grows from that engagement with God and his world. The journey is indeed worth the time and the effort we put into it both alone and together. Like Eddie the Eagle I may not be the best in the world but to fly as far as we can is what God asks us all to do and he will be cheering us on every inch of the way.

This Easter may the resurrection of Jesus bring hope to your heart and strengthen you for the journey ahead.

Recipe for Men's Victoria Sponge

- 125g caster sugar, 125g margarine, 2 large eggs, 125g self raising flour, 2 tsp caster sugar, 2tbsp raspberry jam
- 2. Grease two 17/18cm sandwich tins and line with grease proof paper.
- 3. Beat margarine and sugar until creamy
- 4. Add eggs one at a time, beating and adding 2 teaspoon of flour to prevent curdling.
- 5. Fold in rest of flour and pour into tins.
- 6. Bake in a moderate oven Gas 5/375F/190C for 20/25 minutes until firm on top and slightly shrunk from edges.
- 7. Remove to wire tray to cool.
- 8. When cold peel off paper and sandwich together with raspberry jam.
- 9. Sprinkle caster sugar lightly on top.

GARDENING TIPS FOR MARCH

This early spring month is the gateway to the gardening year, with wintery weather still able to make an appearance, but with the everincreasing day light comes the end of winter dormancy, cooler temperatures just slow down the progress. However, keep an eye on weekly weather forecasts as warmer temperatures can bring seeds into germination. The key to this month is being ready to sow seeds as soon as the ground is suitable.

At the time of writing this at Culkerton Heights we have had the sixth light snowfall of this winter and the accompanying freezing temperatures have kept me inside and off the wet ground. Signs of dryer conditions which have come and then relapsed have manifested in the most obvious; how dry the A433 road becomes or how easily we can open our front door. A week of no puddles on the A road indicates time for some serious cultivating activity on a free draining soil at this time of year, those with clay soils need to be a little more patient. When rain is plentiful we have methods of saving as much as you can for dry weather in the future. Water butts are simple to install and use.

This winter has also been quite sunny, so using a soil covering or cloches to warm and dry the ground prior to sowing is very beneficial.

The garden centres have now stocked up on summer bulbs, so it is a good time to buy, but not plant outside. Onion setts can be stored in a cool, dark place until planting next month, potatoes on the other hand can be chitted in the light, traditionally under the staging of a unheated greenhouse, with the tubers placed upright in wooden boxes, and if frost threatened a thick layer of newspapers was laid over the top for protection. Shallots can be started in individual pots ready to plant out next month. Treat summer flowering bulbs in the same way as onion setts, store for a while and be patient. Tomato, bell peppers and aubergine seeds can all be started now indoors.

In our kitchen over the past few weeks some shoots have appeared on more exotic roots of sweet potatoes and ginger. Both can be grown in this country when our summer is exceptionally hot and sunny and as sub-tropical plants they will still do better in a green house so this is a bit of horticultural fun. Stage one is to encourage more active roots on the ginger by potting up with a good compost and warm keeping indoors with good light. The sweet potato tuber needs to grow longer shoots, known as slips, which will root quite readily in June, so place the sprouting tuber in perlite in a warm place with good light until the slips are about 30cm tall, cut away and root; keep your fingers crossed

for a very hot summer to harvest tubers and seeing the ginger plant flower!

Another plant sometimes left over in the kitchen are a few stems of watercress which is very hardy and will readily make roots, I add these to my garden pond as another pond plant as it makes a very good cover for amphibians and dragonfly nymphs.

There is still time to put up nest boxes for birds, one of the earliest to raise young are Robins who favour a large open entrance. Baby birds need copious amounts of insect food, including greenfly, so one good turn is paid with another.

BUTTERFLY BLUES

By the time you read this I should have seen my first butterfly of the year and the fate of the summer will have become clear. If it's a Brimstone, the golden 'butter-coloured flie', then we will have a good summer; if it's a tawny Comma or a mottled Small Tortoiseshell, the summer could be OK; but if it's a Peacock or a Red Admiral, then Heaven help us. It won't be anything else, for those five all overwinter as hibernating adult butterflies and are the first to appear on the wing. Our other butterflies spend the winter as eggs, caterpillars or pupae and consequently appear later.

The problem is the familiar red and white banded, but mostly black, Red Admiral – a symbol of death and destruction in Victorian art. It seldom used to overwinter here being killed off by snow, frost and ice (remember them?). It was first recorded successfully hibernating here in 1908, in Cornwall – in a rabbit hole, by a butterfly collector out ferreting. However, there were then very few records of early spring, ie overwintered, Red Admirals until the late 1990s, when the advent of mild winters enabled it to overwinter successfully. Now, it is the first butterfly most naturalists encounter each year, not least because it has a lower temperature threshold than the other four hibernating species, flying at around 10°C as opposed to 13°C. Also, it regularly hibernates around centrally heated buildings, and so can be seen sunning itself on the south side of buildings in cool winter sunshine.

Now, this is where I come in – and I wish I didn't. In 54 years of diligent butterfly recording the Brimstone has heralded great summers, and the Comma and Small Tortoiseshell reasonable ones. Our Small Tortoiseshell populations have collapsed, nationally – we're not sure why - so it seldom opens my season nowadays. Red

Admiral populations are buoyant. The Red Admiral had a particularly good year in 2017, and has already been seen by a large number of butterfly activists this year.

I'm trying to avoid it. I'm holding out for 13°C and a golden yellow Brimstone. I owe it to the nation, as we're seriously overdue a decent summer. So I've locked myself away and will rush out into one of the Cotswold valleys, where I know Brimstones hibernate, when the temperature is about to reach 13°C.

I shouldn't be this superstitious, and don't want to be, but the dire summers we've suffered in recent years have been ushered in by me seeing a Peacock, and the broken ones – like 2017 – by me opening with a Red Admiral. It's all my fault. The only two good summers we've had this century, 2003 and 2006, were my last two Brimstone years. The weight of the world is on my shoulders...
