So, God in heaven, from deep in our hearts, we celebrate our Easter joy as a real and precious gift to you. The wax of this Easter candle is the work of bees and people.

For Christ, the morning star, has risen with such beauty; Christ is risen from the dead and his flame of love still burns inside us! Christ shines his peaceful light on all the world! Christ lives and reigns forever.

Milk and Honey Cookies

What you need for 12 biscuits

- 75g 3 rounded tablespoons self raising flour
- 75g 7 tablespoons porridge oats
- 75g 3 rounded tablespoons caster sugar
- 75g butter
- I tbsp honey
- I tbsp milk

How to make them

- I. Heat your oven to 180°C/ Gas Mark 4 grease a baking sheet or cover with baking paper
- 2. Sift flour into a bowl, add the oats and sugar
- 3. In a saucepan, gently melt the butter with the honey and milk. Add the melted mixture to the flour mixture and stir together.
- 4. Form into biscuit shapes and bake for about 15 20 minutes until slightly brown

Are you nifty with knitting needles? Or do you know someone who is? How about creating some knitted bees for your window or Easter wreath?

Fingerprints are great for making bee pictures. Simply use yellow paint to make finger prints and then add stripes and features when they are dry. You can print honey comb using bubble wrap too.



Did you know?



- I. Bees have five eyes and six legs.
- 2. Bees can see all colours except red. That and their sense of smell help them find the flowers they need to collect pollen.
- 3. Each bee has 170 odorant receptors, which means they have one serious sense of smell.
- 4. Honey bees are great flyers. They fly at a speed of around 25km per hour and beat their wings 200 times per second.
- 5. Over the past 15 years, colonies of bees have been disappearing, and the reason remains unknown. In some regions, up to 90% of bees have disappeared.

Prayer Ideas



Kind words are like honey—sweet to the taste and good for your health. (Proverbs 16:24 GNT)

For this prayer space activity you will need something sweet to slowly eat, perhaps a piece of honeycomb, a milk and honey cookie or even an Easter egg.

Find a quiet moment and a quiet place to enjoy your sweet snack and see how slowly you can eat it and how long you can make it last.

As you do this consider the words of Proverbs 16:24. Think about how kind words could be like honey. Did you know honey has been used as a medicine for over 5,000 years and is particularly good for healing wounds? Do you think kind words can heal?

Savour the taste of your sweet snack. How good does it taste? Think again about those kind words. Can you think of any times when someone has said something kind to you?

Pray that you will make the most of any opportunity you have to say kind words to people and your words will be like honey – able to bring sweetness and healing.
