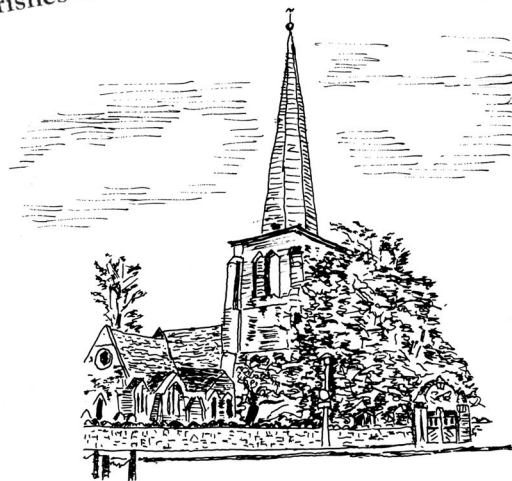

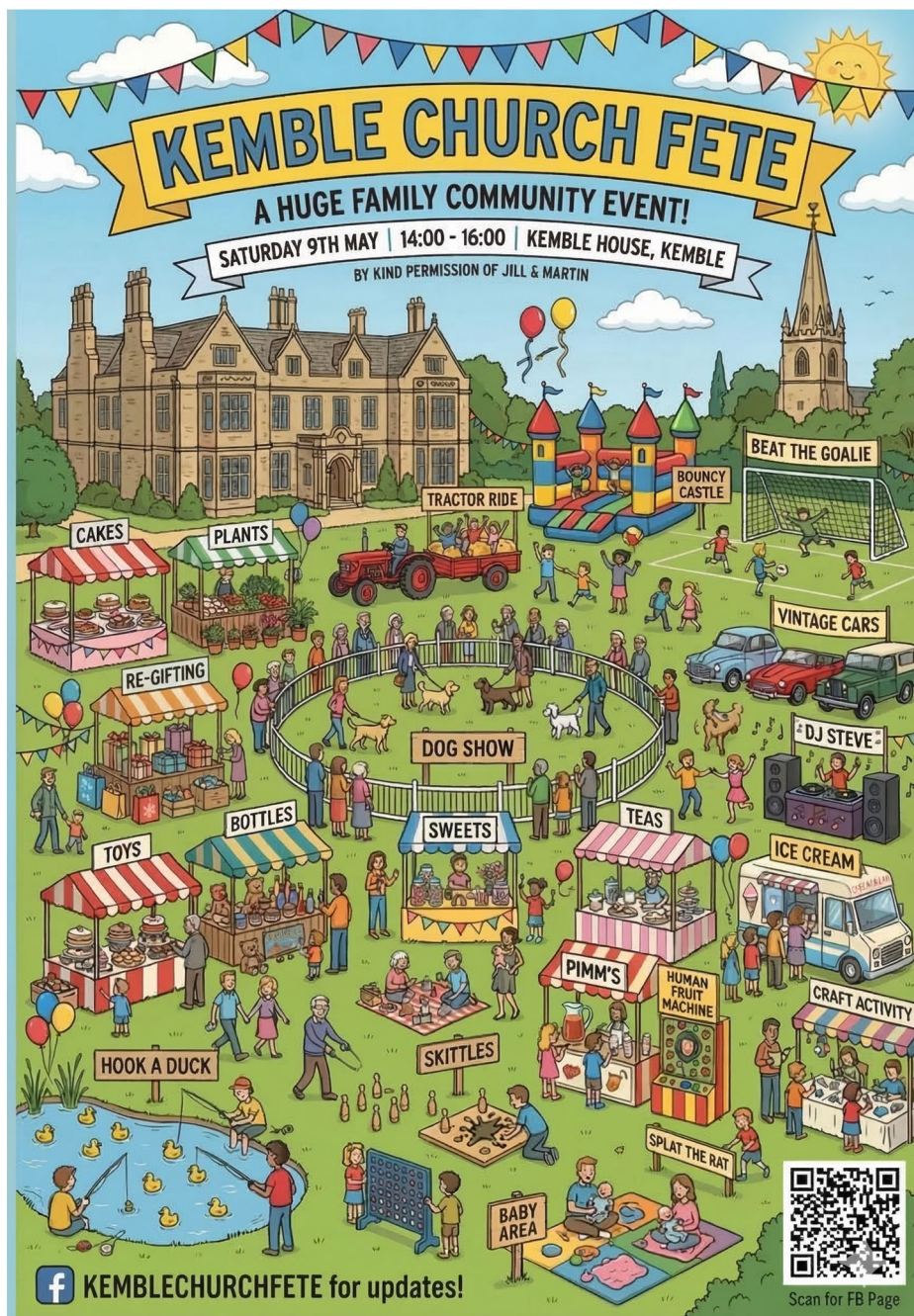

Halleluiah, Christ is risen!



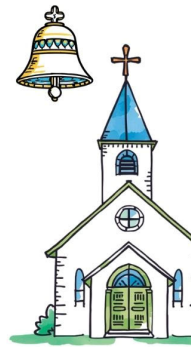

Kemble Church holds one of 3000 Eco Church awards, which help churches to care for God's creation.

The results are now in for the Big Garden Birdwatch. Sadly, numbers of many common species, including robins and blackbirds, have decreased since last year. There is even worse news for greenfinches and chaffinches, and research has shown that garden bird feeders are contributing by spreading trichomonosis, which affects the throat and gullet, making it difficult for birds to swallow food. The RSPB has issued new advice on feeding birds: in particular to stop using bird tables altogether and to only use seed and peanut feeders from November to April.

The best way to support garden birds is to encourage natural sources of food, such as insects and their larvae through planting wildflowers and leaving berries and seed heads. Leaving some (or all) grass uncut during No Mow May also contributes to the supply of fresh food.

Here are some other ways we can join in:

May is **National Walking Month** - as women are more likely to make multi-purpose journeys, such as combining school drop-offs, care responsibilities and errands within a single trip, Living Streets encourages women to go for a walk for their own enjoyment.

**No Mow May** - freeing us from hours of mowing to appreciate the beauty of our wildflowers and insects.

27 April – 3 May - **National Gardening Week** – share your passion for plants. You can find tips and advice on the RHS website.

3 May - **International Dawn Chorus Day** – In the UK the dawn chorus is at its peak just before and just after sunrise (5.33am), so ideally you would be sitting still with a cup of something warm around 5am.

3-9 May - **Hedgehog awareness week** – for advice on looking after them, including the fundraising campaign: <https://www.britishhedgehogs.org.uk/>

9 May – **Litter picking** – meet at the Tavern at 10.30 – all welcome. **Cirencester Repair Café** will also be open from 10.00 – 13.00 at the Baptist Church.

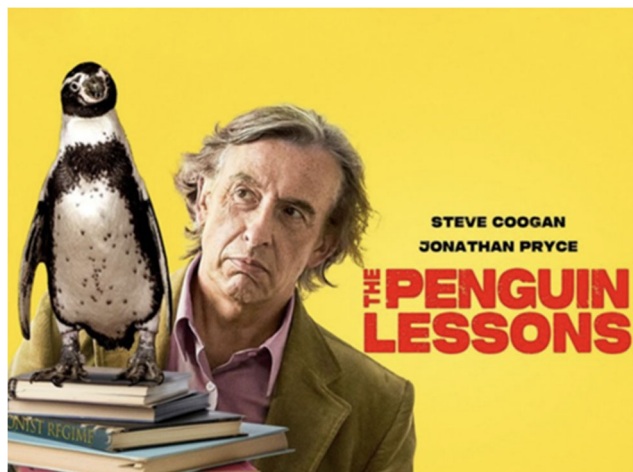

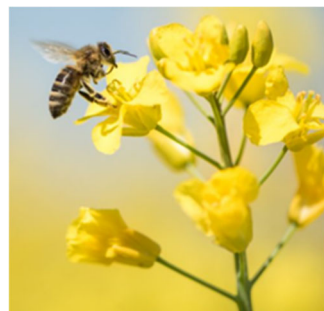

## Farming Matters

It's nice to see a little colour coming back into the countryside after what seems to have been a long, cold, wet winter. Although spring appeared somewhat reluctant to show its full glory, we can now appreciate the usual seasonal colours. Early March saw the white flowers of the Blackthorn which produces flowers before its leaves and ultimately produces sloes in the autumn. The flowering Blackthorn is often associated with a false spring, with more cold weather to come. That was certainly the case this year. We are now enjoying the white flowers of the Hawthorn in our hedgerows, a completely different species, which produces leaves first then flowers, and eventually produces the red hawthorns in autumn. More seasonal colour is provided by a carpet of bluebells and the white flowers of the wild garlic seen in many wooded areas locally and the strong yellow flowers of the oilseed rape crop, brightening up our fields.



Oilseed rape is a member of the cabbage family and is reliant on insects for pollination to produce the small black seeds which will be harvested in late July for their oil content. However, beekeepers report a very disappointing spring with many hives being lost due to the prolonged cold, wet weather earlier in the year. The extremely wet conditions of early 2026 ranked as one of the wettest on record for parts of England, experiencing over 50 consecutive days of rain in some areas, with 230% of the long-term average rainfall. March rainfall however was below normal for much of England providing some relief. Nature has a way of levelling up so hopefully plants relying on pollinators get the service they need.

Tractors have been busy in the fields in recent weeks as crops sown last autumn like wheat and oilseed rape need feeding with essential nutrients. Farmers can now get out into the fields to cultivate and plant spring sown crops like malting barley, maize and potatoes. This has been an ideal year to gain the most benefit from cover crops. Rather than leave fields empty over winter and vulnerable to nutrient loss through leaching or run-off, cover crops are planted following harvest to soak up the residual nutrients, avoiding these potential losses during periods of heavy rain. The cover crop is destroyed in spring, mulched into the soil and the nutrients released as the vegetation breaks down, making them available to the spring planted crop. This age-old practice has come into its own this year with ideal planting conditions in the autumn, heavy winter rainfall and good planting conditions in the spring.

But all is not rosy in the farmyard. The Iran war has disrupted supplies of not only oil but fertilisers as well. Diesel used by farmers for field operations and drying crops does not carry the same level of fuel duty that road diesel used by motorists and hauliers does. So, increases in crude oil prices has a greater impact on farm diesel, which is coloured red to differentiate it from white road diesel. Red diesel has doubled in price since the war broke out.

Although diesel fuel represents only around 5% of the total crop production costs, the doubling of any cost will have a significant impact. The real pain comes from increased fertiliser costs. The UK imports roughly 60% of its total nitrogen fertiliser requirement. While the EU provides most ammonium nitrate, the Middle East and North Africa are significant suppliers of urea. Fertiliser prices have risen by 40% in some cases in recent weeks. These price rises will have a greater impact on crop production costs as fertilisers represent around 35% of the total costs.

Natural gas is a major requirement for fertiliser manufacture so even without shipping disruption, fertiliser production costs will increase significantly with fuel cost increases. There may be a delayed effect as most farmers will have bought fertiliser for the 2026 season before the Middle East crisis erupted. Consumer Price Index inflation was 3% immediately prior to the Iran war but Agflation (a measure of farm input inflation) is currently running at 7.6%. Of course, the whole food supply chain is very dependent on fuel for transport and processing, so food costs are likely to rise sharply if the conflict continues for any length of time.

May Day in the UK originates from ancient pagan festivals, primarily the Celtic festival of Beltane, marking the start of summer with fertility rituals. Traditionally celebrated on May 1st, it evolved to include dancing around a maypole and crowning a May Queen. Celebrated as the first day of summer it included fire festivals to bless livestock and ensure fertility. The first official May Day Bank Holiday was established in 1978, often linking traditional spring celebrations with International Workers' Day.
