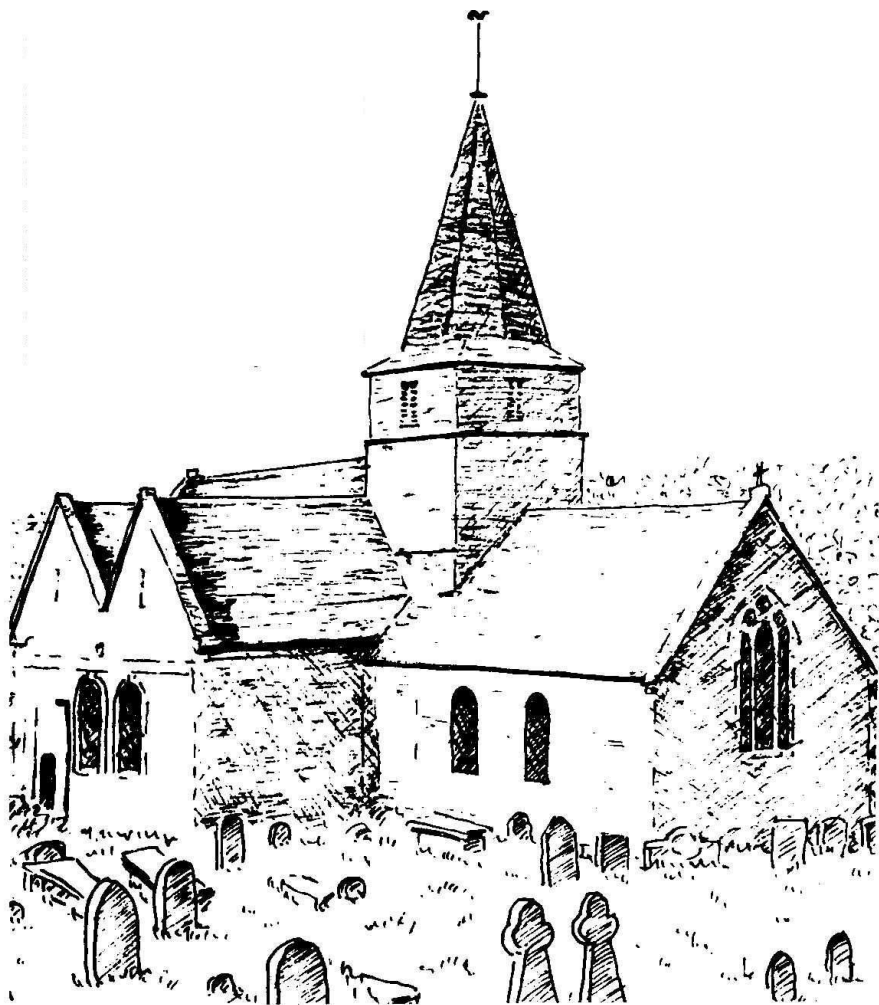

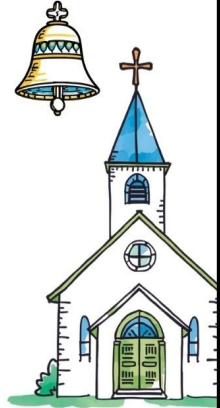

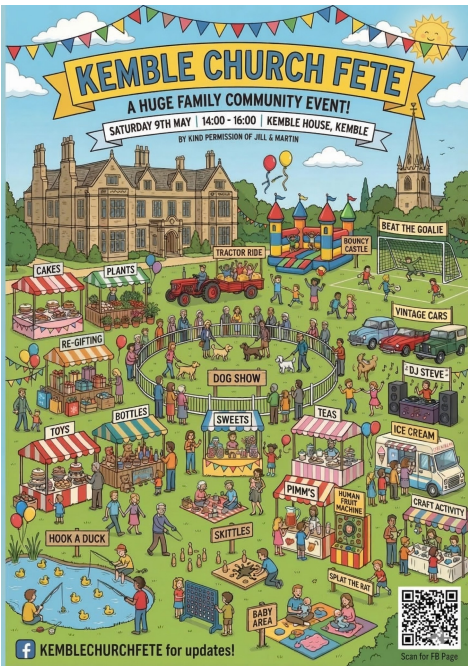

The children threw themselves into a packed programme of outdoor adventures including canoeing, rock climbing and gorge walking, showing resilience, teamwork and no small amount of bravery along the way. Evenings were just as memorable, with activities such as a night walk and a spot of ten-pin bowling helping to round off an unforgettable experience. It was wonderful to see the pupils challenge themselves, support one another and make memories that will last a lifetime.

Back at school, we were delighted with the fantastic response to the Gloucestershire Young Photographer of the Year competition. We received a strong group of entries, showcasing creativity, observation and a great eye for detail. ## **OATES NOTES FROM CULKERTON**

### **GARDENING TIPS FOR MAY**

The climate changes keep coming along and so many plants usually associated with May have flowered in April. As the sap rose in deciduous trees and shrubs, producing the beautiful fresh light green foliage of May has already happened, a month in advance in April. Once again Magnolias looked truly magnificent and there was no frost. It was a relief that seasonal showers eventually came in the second week of April, encouraging early sowings to germinate. At one point it looked like another very dry month this year when a drop of useful rain is much appreciated.

Deep rooted mature trees and other perennials do well with warmer wet winters. Bulbs, and rhizomes especially have favoured last year's heat waves followed by a mild wet winter. Perennial vegetables consistently have a low survival rate in wet winters, sadly missed as for many years very dependable when grown in the open ground. Winter protection is now needed against the rain rather than cold weather.

On the plus side, frosts are less of a problem and we will be very unlucky to have a late frost this month so tender vegetables like courgettes, pumpkins and other squashes can be planted out if the weather is suitable. Enrich the soil first for these hungry feeders with plenty of moisture retaining nutrient rich organic compost. Peas and French Beans can be sown directly or germinated inside and then planted out.

Potatoes and onions have proved to be less reliable crops, with rain and heat coming at the wrong phase for these crops. Dry when they need to grow and wet at harvest times. Chives often seem to get overlooked as an excellent way to incorporate an onion flavour and these grow well with little water. Frozen chive butter or any other herb butter is obviously then available all year round.

From observation of an early set of flowers, gooseberries are doing well. I have fine mesh covers to prevent pigeons from eating the fruit. Gradually fruit bushes are lifted and replanted over winter into my fruit cage. Black and Red Currants are already under protection in the cage, joining Tayberries, Logan Berries and hardy Desert Grape vines. I prefer to use chicken wire than plastic netting so wild birds do not become entangled.

## **OATES NOTES FROM CULKERTON (cont)**

Continue to make successional sowings of salad leaves until the hot dry weather when watering by hand becomes over demanding.

Dahlias and other tender flowering plants need covering with horticultural fleece if this month has cold nights. Newly planted out seedlings will need temporary covers from sudden heavy downpours or shaded if an early heat wave comes up from the south.

Most importantly care for your garden soil, cover with mulch to maintain moisture. Make as much garden compost as possible, shred with a mower or shredder to speed decomposition. Use every scrap of healthy organic material available; grass mowings, trimmed flower dead heads and annual weeds.

### **SPRING RACES AHEAD**

Spring is racing ahead of itself. It seems that seldom, if ever, has a summer wanted so desperately to be born, begging the question of when our farms will start combining barley... early June, or even the end of May? Whenever, we all hope that it will worth cutting this year.

This column recalls that elder was in bloom on 10th May 2017, on the M5. That was remarkably early, as elder used to start flowering at the start of June - after a fine spring. Now, this year, I saw elder in bloom on 8th April (just past Dobbies on the A419) – and that really is off the trolley. Our bluebells were at peak then, three or four weeks early, and the daffs had all but finished by Easter. The blossom lingered long, unsullied by rain or frost. Over in the sunnier and warmer West Sussex Weald, oaks were leafing well before the end of March. Here, where seasonality is less advanced, many beeches leafed early and even the ash trees, the ultimate climate change deniers, are flowering early.

Caught in a maelstrom of early leafing, the caterpillars of the nation's midsummer butterflies and moths are even more advanced, but I'll spare you the details – it's too wacky even to be a specialist subject on Mastermind. Suffice it that a Ministerial Statement on the State of the Nation's Caterpillars would be interesting, though The Commons would instantly empty.

Our summer migrant birds, though, have been arriving on time – or thereabouts, as they tend to get held up by northerlies. Culkerton's

Swallows and House Martins started to show up at the end of April's first week. That's normal. However, in our garden, the resident blackbirds were about to start their second brood – in mid-April, now that's not normal.

As Fred Trueman used to bemoan so earnestly on Test Match Special, in broad Yorkshire: "I doan't know what's going off out there anymore." That is precisely how naturalists and countryside lovers feel just now. Change within the natural world is becoming radicalised. Naturalists have been knocked right out of their comfort zone and now expect the unexpected.

It all begs the question of whatever next? Of course, the wheels could fall off and a miserably wet summer could develop – as has happened after many a fine spring, but the coming summer seems to harbour serious intent. Somehow, my intuition senses an intense long hot summer. Watch this space...

## **ROOTED IN PLACE: CARING FOR THE SOUTH COTSWOLDS by *Dr Roz Savage MP***

Spring has well and truly arrived. Across the South Cotswolds, the hedgerows are thickening, the meadows brightening, and the evenings stretching out in the most welcome way. After the long pull of winter, there is something quietly joyful about watching the countryside come back to life - the blackthorn blossoming in the lanes, the first swallows overhead, and the fields returning to that vivid green that only comes with Spring rain.

It is a time that invites us to look forward - and to think carefully about the future we want to build, together.

I have been reflecting on that a good deal recently. I was fortunate to attend an event at Parliament exploring long-term thinking in public life, how we build institutions and make decisions that serve not just this generation, but the next. The discussion touched on something that feels very relevant to life in communities like Coates, Rodmarton and the villages nearby: so many of the challenges we face; whether that is the state of our rural roads, the resilience of our food supply, or the wellbeing of our villages, require us to think well beyond the next few months or years. A tree planted today shades a garden for decades. The same principle applies to the decisions we make now about our land, our water, and the communities we want to leave behind.

Regarding roads, I have been working on behalf of residents experiencing poor road conditions around Rodmarton - one of several casework issues I have been pressing with the relevant authorities. Rural roads are the arteries of communities like ours. When they are neglected, the impact is felt every single day, by everyone from farmers to families doing the school run. This is not a glamorous issue, but it is an important one, and I will keep pushing for the investment and attention these roads deserve.

In late March I spent a day out and about in the area around Kemble, which was a reminder of just how much I value this part of the constituency; the quiet lanes, the wide skies, and the sense that this landscape has been tended carefully by the people who live and work in it for generations.

Back in Westminster, I hosted a parliamentary screening of Channel 4 docudrama *Dirty Business*, which highlighted the ongoing scandal of sewage discharge in our rivers and waterways. Clean water is not a political issue; it is a fundamental one. People across Coates, Rodmarton and the wider South Cotswolds care about the health of

the waterways that run through this landscape, and so do I. I will keep pressing for the transparency, and investment that our rivers need.

Spring feels like a prompt to act with care and intention. Our landscape is a living thing, shaped by the choices of every generation that has tended it. Let us make sure we tend it well.
