

LIGHT IN THE DARKNESS

As winter deepens and the days grow short, we find ourselves surrounded by darkness more than at any other time of year. This is the time of year you need a torch with you, especially when walking around our villages. It's precisely in these months that we fill our homes and streets with different forms of light, whether they are twinkling Christmas lights, glowing candles, or the gentle warmth of a fireplace. There's something about light that draws us in, lifts our spirits, and gives us hope.

Light is a powerful symbol, notably in the Christian faith. At Christmas time we think of hope coming into our messed-up world, as a baby, who is called Immanuel "God with us". Let's keep doing this, whether that is reaching out to an isolated neighbour, supporting local charities, volunteering, or simply offering a listening ear. Even small acts of kindness can brighten someone's day and help demonstrate the Light and hope we have in Christ.

Then as we move from Christmas into a new year, let's carry this theme of light with us. The world needs hope and we have the privilege of being able to celebrate this hope that we have in Christ and share it, through words and deeds. Whether 2025 has been a year of joy or challenge for you, know that the light of Jesus shines on, steady, faithful and true, for all to know and experience.

IT TAKES A CHILD

The decorations were in place, the tree all ready, just one more day to go for Christmas Eve when the stockings could be put up at the bottom of the bed. A contented little girl slept well until the sound of shooting noises woke her. Almost immediately her mother came into the bedroom in the darkness, picked up her sleeping younger brother and whispered for her to get up quietly and quickly come! Following her into the internal hallway she joined her older brothers where clothes were handed out from the airing cupboard and they dressed themselves. Her father appeared at the doorway and gave instructions; follow each other without any noise and get into the car, we must leave, no fuss, just as quickly as possible do as he said and all will be well.

Dazed and confused all the children seemingly slept on and off during the journey which was slow and silent as the sun gently rose in the sky. When they came to a halt and were ushered from the car into a guardroom, it was clear that they would not be going back home again. Tea and toast were brought to them for breakfast, then much discussion of what was to happen to them next? The Charity staff were very kind, but finding accommodation for a family of seven including five children aged between 3-4yrs and 12-16yrs just before Christmas was no easy task. Being the only girl aged 7-8yrs, a family with just the one girl around the same age was where she was placed. Her mother made it clear that wherever the children were housed, the whole family was to be together at the Church closest to them on Christmas morning.

It was a strange experience, taking time to be alone on the morning of Christmas Eve she stepped outside into the courtyard garden and let her tears flow. Not knowing where her family were, she clung to the request her mother had made and did the only thing she could. She prayed The Lord's Prayer as taught at home, school and Church. The sunlight glistened through her tears and she felt a shadow pass over her giving a feeling of calm and strength.

Christmas morning and after her stocking and breakfast, she was taken to the Church where just in time before the service began the whole family were united. During the service a lady spoke who had heard of the evacuation and invited her family to join them for Christmas dinner, all seven of them, what generosity! Isn't that what Christmas does? In the midst of the worst situations and conditions it

can bring out the very best in people. The birth of a child far from home, exiled through danger to life, who changed the world through his life and teaching still has the power to touch and change our lives today. The child in each of us and in every child has the same choice and ability for sharing those gifts of kindness and hope. Jesus said, "Unless we have faith like that of a child we cannot enter the kingdom of God." May our actions this Christmas, however small, lead us all to peace and joy within and give hope through generosity of spirit for the New Year ahead.

GARDENING TIPS FOR DECEMBER AND JANUARY

This autumn's colours have been delightful, with many weeks of display. Variations of gold have been the dominant hue, ranging from almost a lemon yellow through 'old gold' Oak trees, to vibrant yellow, changing to rich burnt orange of Beech trees, complemented by a scatter of deep burgundy shrubs. Some trees and shrubs have multi colour combinations due to the four heatwaves experienced this last year, lots of sun, high temperatures and the shock of drought.

Most established trees and shrubs have faired very well; deep roots unaffected by less rainfall, resulted in liberal branch growth. Our Judas Tree severely damaged and split apart during a storm last winter, now has a multitude of new two-meter lengths. Even shrubs in pots, left desiccated and looking quite dead have revived, showing positive signs of life with new leaf buds. Give dead looking plants and shrubs a chance to grow back.

For keen gardeners there is an event to look forward to next summer, the Royal Horticultural Society (RHS) are holding a major show at Badminton, 8th to 12th July 2026.

Looking further into the future, during 2027 the National Garden Scheme will be celebrating a centenary year. In Gloucestershire there are a few gardens which opened in 1927 still open, raising funds for health charities. The NGS welcomes new gardens, not necessarily large, but with about 45 minutes of interest, for a gentle walk around and possibly tea with cake to follow.

This winter, my usual tips are to enjoy the cold weather inside with a good gardening book, tidy up your greenhouse and garden shed, check tools for some basic maintenance. Also, this is much best time of year to plant new trees and shrubs, including roses, prepare the ground. Staking might be advisable for taller specimens, especially if winter storms are forecast. During cold frost-free days, pruning apple and pear fruit trees is ideal, mostly this only needs a light touch of removing inward crossing branches, allowing easy access for picking and better air circulation.

Considering the beautiful autumn colours, I walked around a local garden centre with notebook in hand to see which might be on a wish list for good colour and winter interest. The first plant to catch attention was a Pinus mugo 'Carsten's Wintergold', with golden tips to growing points from October to April. This form is a slow growing, hugging the ground rather than being a tree, there are many named forms of this mountain pine tree, Pinus mugo, all slow growing of different shapes

and heights, Another evergreen with golden highlights is Taxus 'Standishii', an upright yew, also slow growing, about 150cm tall in 10 years forming a neat column.

Mahonias produce beautiful, usually fragrant sprays of small yellow flowers during the winter months, 'Winter Sun' is a shorter at 120cm. Euonymus fortune 'Emerald and Gold, has variegated foliage which turns pink and burgundy over winter, forming a leafy mound 40cm high.

Another to consider is a more exotic looking Sophora microphylla 'Sun King', with fern like foliage, producing clusters of yellow bell-shaped flowers in late winter, although hardy, this shrub appreciates a sheltered position in sun.

LOOKING FORWARD TO WINTER

Yes, I foolishly set myself the task of writing a piece under this title, having struggled with our darker months for well over half a cognizant century. Maybe I love spring and summer too much.

But winter paves the way to spring and once spring is sprung we quickly forget whatever it was that winter served up, especially the mild, soggy ones that characterise this modern era. Sooner rather than later, we will have to banish our fantasy about Christmas being a time of snow and frost, with ice fairs on the frozen Thames – and accept the reality of mud, puddle, vehicle splash and headlight glare. Snow scene Christmas cards are, sadly, becoming a trifle absurd.

Winter is a progression, a journey into spring, back into lightfulness. There are events that illuminate that journey, markers along the way. Christmas and New Year are obvious steps in that progression.

I look out diligently for the arrival of the Fieldfares, and track their flock movements through the winter. We live in high-grade Fieldfare terrain. This winter, there is a veritable surfeit of berries for them and their cousins, the Redwings. These birds arrived here late this autumn, delayed by – you've guessed it – mild weather.

Given the abundance of nuts, seeds and berries, this could be a tremendous winter for a whole bevvy of winter visiting birds, hopefully including Hawfinches and Waxwings. Watch out too for unusually large (by modern standards) flocks of Wood Pigeons, especially around beech and oak woods. Time was when pigeon flocks

blackened many a rural winter sky.

Another joyous sign of winter's approach is stepping on the first Woodcock of the season, off path, deep in the woods. This year, I flushed my first out on Armistice Day, under gloomy skies, whilst looking at the ending of a superb display of autumnal woodland fungi. Off it shot, zig-zagging through the hazel wands. "Welcome, Brother Woodcock!" I whispered, though of course it might well have been a female. Around here, Woodcock are winter migrants from continental Europe.

Best of all, is the coming of the hazel catkins, which transform whole landscapes with a mustard haze. The autumn gales exposed a massive crop of catkins, presumably stimulated by the hot summer. Some seem poised to flower ridiculously early, but poised they certainly are.

Best of all are the signs of advancing spring that star-stud the winter days: the first Great Tit calling, the first Snowdrop, and so on; and winter offers by far the best sunsets. As ever, the light shines in the darkness...

Hoping to collect and recycle more trees than ever this year, Longfield in partnership with Just Helping, is aiming to raise more than £85,000, which could help fund over 1,000 hours of Hospice at Home care, or support free wellbeing, bereavement and counselling services for those in Gloucestershire.
