Dear Friends

When the day of Pentecost came, they were all together in one place. Suddenly a sound like the blowing of a violent wind came from heaven and filled the whole house where they were sitting. They saw what seemed to be tongues of fire that separated and came to rest on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other tongues as the Spirit enabled them. **Acts 2:1-4**

Have you ever experienced something so incredible that when you tried to explain it to someone else, you couldn't find the right words? Luke's account of the coming of the Holy Spirit to the disciples describes how a group of frightened men and women are transformed and given a new hope, a new heart and a new purpose. It was so incredible that even those who witnessed it didn't believe it at first!

Two thousand and more years later, it is still difficult to comprehend.

The Holy Spirit enabled the disciples to come out of hiding and proclaim the good news of the resurrection; to set in motion that which Jesus had prayed for 'Your kingdom come, on earth as it is in heaven'. They were ordinary men and women – just as we are and we are also called to proclaim the same good news of God's love for us. Just as these men and women were transformed into energetic and outspoken witnesses of Jesus, so can we be transformed today.

But how can we share God's love? How does the Holy Spirit enable us to find the courage to speak out in faith? We live in a world that is changing around us every day. One of the things we can do is ask God to intervene; to transform our world and our hearts to love one another more deeply; and pray that people would come to know the love, hope, peace of Jesus.

Thy Kingdom Come is a global ecumenical prayer movement that invites Christians around the world to pray from Ascension to Pentecost for more people to come to know Jesus. This year's initiative runs from 9 – 19 May, and there will be opportunities to engage with different events across the Benefice – do look out for them. One thing we could all do is praying the Lord's prayer at 9am and 9pm each day – set your alarm to remind you!

However, engaging in conversations about God's love and transforming power should not be confined to 11 days in the year – if we want to see God's kingdom on earth, then as Christians we must share our stories and pray for our neighbours (locally and globally) 365 days a year (or 366 this year!).

Father God, We pray for The Thameshead Benefice; that we may be truly united as we come together, whatever our background or culture, to worship you sharing our common belief and trust in You. We pray

for peace, respect and unity as we seek to see Christ in each other, inspiring and encouraging each individual to express their love for You. May our churches be places of peace and safety, joy and love and full of your glory. Help us to share responsibility, grow in faith, love one another, care for those in need, reach out to others, and welcome newcomers and visitors. Fill us with vision and joy and keep us faithful in prayer, word and worship and help us to know and share how much each of us are loved by You. May we see your kingdom come here in the Thameshead Benefice, to the glory of your name. Amen.





We have been treated to fantastic performances from the Rock Steady bands at Rodmarton this week, who entertained both staff and parents at their recent concert. Children from across the school – Reception to Year 6 -worked as individual bands performing a song of their choice, each child playing a different instrument including drums, electric guitars, keyboard and



bass as well as vocalists. The term has been full of music with Oak class also coming to the end of their weekly trumpet lessons. A concert for parents and the school will also be held by the Oak Class trumpeters.

While the museum is well known for local Roman artefacts, it also holds several Anglo-Saxon and Viking pieces from the local area. The children took part in a workshop and had time exploring the museum.

Across the school, the children have taken part in a range of sporting events. Year 3-6 children were invited to take part in Cross Country races at Deer Park and Kingshill schools. With around 25 children in each race, the event was competitive but the Rodmarton runners held strong positions and most importantly enjoyed taking part. In addition, Arthur has represented the school at two County races in the last few years and has placed within the top 15 for the County – well done Arthur.

Sapling children have taken part in an Orienteering event at Westonbirt Arboretum – having fun finding controls around the historic site. A team of Year 5 and 6 children entered the National Schools Dodgeball event at the beginning of the month. Rodmarton was by far the smallest school to attend but this didn't stop the children securing 3rd place overall within Gloucestershire. A huge achievement.

Rodmarton pupils have also been busy competing in an Oracy event. Three children, one from each of our classes, were selected from school and took part in the Cirencester area competition – with over 30 other schools. Our competitive journey stopped there but our love for Oracy has definitely been ignited.

NOTES FROM CULKERTON

GARDENING TIPS FOR MAY

May is a beautiful month, when spring steps into summer; the big question is how will the weather unfold? As I type this piece the Meteorological Office has released the latest figures for March: record breaking warmth and precipitation. For gardeners, this combination is ideal growing conditions, the difficulty is getting out into the garden and making the most of short dry spells. Our narrow grass paths on slopes have at times become sloppy mud and decidedly dangerous with several slipping falls. Time to make a few changes; perhaps add a central double line of bricks and steps.

There have been very few frosts in spring. A few weeks ago my allotment neighbour planted out four courgettes as the temperatures were acceptable and possibly there will be no late frosts. This is worth trying if you are prepared to replace plants if they fail. Be bold and tenacious.

Usually, May is the month of fruit blossom, especially apple trees, many of these have bloomed ahead of schedule. Fortunately, our friends the pollinating insects have been active earlier as well.

Interestingly for the observant amongst you readers, some flowering trees including different varieties of apples will have noticed some stayed dormant while others came into bloom. In early April, I had worried gardens asking if the trees had died over winter. The trees duly sprouted after the daylight hours increased. There seem to be two main triggers for plant growth: temperature and light. Therefore, some varieties of apples were responding to the mild spring weather and others were waiting for longer days.

My hibernating hedgehogs also emerged with the longer days.

All the plum family of trees bloomed well during mid-April, fingers crossed for a good crop of fruit from these, our greengage was full of blossom looking like a giant spirea in bloom.

As we all had delayed gardening sessions with the constant rain for many months, our winter tidy up was disrupted, so now is the time for a good spring clean of the garden. Clear out any 'might be useful wood', old rotting canes, or old spoilt wooden garden furniture. Get on to weeding, especially on dry sunny days when it is a pleasure being outside. Check woody plants for die back and trim lightly also remove dry standing stems left over winter. As narcissi and tulips finish blooming, remove dead heads and give these bulbs a Tomorite feed to help make good bulbs for next year's blooms.

NOTES FROM CULKERTON (cont)

There are so many seeds to sow this month, Runner and French Beans, either in pots or direct, depending on weather or space. Herbs, parsley, coriander, dill, fennel including the bulbing types. Courgettes, squashes and pumpkins. Summer lettuce and rocket. Sweetcorn direct if the soil is warm. All next autumn and winter's brassicas, Brussel Sprouts, Kales and collards. Plant out tomatoes and sow basil.

Make your garden joyful with as many flowers that will fill spaces, annuals as seeds or small plants. Pots full of summer flowers wherever a space needs a shot of colour.

SPRING RISING

We would have had a wonderful Easter, had the UK implemented its 1928 Easter Act, which sets Easter for the day after the second Saturday in April – but has never been enacted. That balmy mid-April weekend, warmth and sunshine broke through spectacularly, for the first time since early October: Swallows and House Martins arrived and skimmed the stilling skies, Chiffchaffs dink-dinked in every copse, Holly Blue and Orange Tip butterflies wandered the lanes as if out of Narnia, and our world arose from several months of flood, bog, mud and pothole. As it was, the cold and interminably wet early Easter of 2024 is best forgotten...

The mild winter and early spring meant that many elements of our flora and fauna have leapt ahead of any norm we might want to apply, notably the vegetation. By mid-April I had seen Elder in bloom, and Ox-eye Daisies and Red Clover flowering along road verges. Now, those are features of early June, or late May in an early year. This was on top of oaks being well in leaf, and in flower, and the bulk of the nation's daffodils being finished by that dire early Easter. As Fred Trueman used to say on Test Match Special, 'I doan't know what's going off out there anymore...' (usually in response to England fielding without a Third Man).

The state of the nation's caterpillars speaks even louder, though few of us assiduously work them. Insect's push limits, any limit: indeed, for insect, think wannabe locust. Here it can be revealed that the caterpillars of many of our midsummer butterflies are three or four weeks ahead of their norms. Only the rains have held them back, the winter and early spring temperatures didn't. Unless the rains continue

ad nauseam, butterflies like Meadow Brown, Marbled White and His Gloriousity the Purple Emperor are going to be well out by the start of June – unprecedentedly early.

We are left pondering, whatever next?, in the absence of any semblance of a longer range weather forecasting system. The one thing the beleaguered farming and building industries – and many others – need is a confident seasonal weather forecast system, but we're lucky if we get an accurate weekly forecast. Moreover, those of us who regard themselves as being relatively in touch with the natural world, find that they have lost the one thing they relied on most – confidence in their intuitive feel. 'I doan't know what's going off out there anymore...'
